We also thank our April's Host, Team V Squad led by the Venus-President Nominee Susan. Thank you too to our last week's Guest of Honor and Speaker, Engr. Benjamin Ventura, the Assistant Regional Director of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, Cordillera Administrative Region (DENR – CAR) for an engaging and educational presentation of their office's projects for this year 2023.

This week started with a cluster 1C project together with the Department of Health - Baguio on the MR-OPV SIA Kickoff Activity (Measles Rubella – Oral Polio Vaccine Supplemental Immunization Activity), a project on End Polio Plus, which was held last Tuesday, May 02, 2023 at the Malcolm Square. Thank you Rtn Nancy for attending this worthwhile project and for representing the Rotary Club of Baguio.

There are 16 RHUs in our very own City. Cluster 1C Secretary suggested that the 16 barangays be divided among the clubs in the cluster, wherein we offered to be with the RHU of the Loakan barangay, since we have adopted their child development centers (day care centers). In that way, we have an extensive presence in our adopted CDCs, not only in terms of Basic Education and Literacy, thru Project 1, but also to one of RI's major project – Eradicating Polio Plus. We are encouraging our dear members to please support this immunization activity. The date of which shall be announced in our chat room, once we get the final date.

Let us also thank our Global Grant Guru(s), PP Gerard, PP Chris F and PP Bert on their Wednesday (May 03, 2023) afternoon meeting for

another round of answering PP Annie Shin's queries. Surely, their dedication and passion to this Global Grant will pave the way for its successful approval and implementation. Kudos to the three of you.

Yesterday, Friday May 05, 2023, Dir Lou and I dropped by Tiong San Bazaar, to look at the Smart TV (WIFI and Blue Tooth ready) , we were planning to purchase for the our 11 adopted CDCs. The said planned purchase was made possible thru our District Grant Application (DG # 2343899) submitted to District Gov Ann Lorenzana together with an MOU , one of the requisites before we can avail of the DGF. In line with this, (yours truly) the RC Baguio President of this RY committed for a USD 18,000.00 TRF donation from our club, which we are still in the process of completing the said amount, of course with your help, dear members of RC Baguio, where in your President is very confident to reach this goal by the end of May 2023 because of you, our club members - magnanimity.

The discounted cost of one 42 – inch Astron Smart TV and its bracket is PhP 8,900.00 and PhP 162.00 respectively for a total cost of PhP 99,682.00. The said equipment shall be delivered to the said schools before the end of this RY with a MOA signing between the respective CDC and our club.

This project will benefit our less fortunate learners, and that they may become more competitive and also be at par with the private sector as far as having this facility is concerned.

Thank you very much for your donation to The Rotary Foundation, wherein a portion of our donation comes back, for us to implement some of our projects and that we can again say, at the end of the day, the Rotary Club of Baguio made and will make a difference to the community(ies) it serves.

While we thank, our April Birthday Celebrants (Past Presidents Marilyn, Atom and Veeh and Dir Tonton) for their treats of ice cream and cakes, may we also greet our PP Ben and PP Gerard who celebrated their special natal days on May 03 and 04, 2023 respectively, a very Happy Birthday, we wish you the best of health, and may all your wishes and prayers be granted. God bless you more.



RI President Message for May 2023



I believe it is a time in our world for brave, courageous, intentional leadership.

Anni shared a very personal story about coping with a panic attack, something that I have also experienced. The outpouring and response to this story have been tremendous and punctuate how critical it is that we acknowledge not only our strengths but our vulnerabilities too.

When we talk about finding space for one another — creating comfort and care within Rotary — we're describing a club experience where we can all feel comfortable sharing like Anni did, and we can all empathize with and support one another. Whatever we are facing in life, Rotary is a place where we know we're not alone.

We spend so much time helping our world, whether it's working to end polio, cleaning up the environment, or bringing hope to communities that need it most. Sometimes we can lose track of the need to apply some of our energy and care to our fellow members and partners in service.

The comfort and care of our members is the single greatest driver of member satisfaction and retention. We need to ensure that it remains a priority — and that we further strengthen these bonds by performing service that helps reduce the stigma of seeking out mental health treatment and expands access to care.

4 ways to elevate youth voices

1. Work toward their goals, not yours

This is a club by and for young people — allow them to be the ones to shape it. Remember, Rotary members are there to mentor young people, not manage them. Meet them where they are. Let them set the priorities and ask them how you can best support their goals.

2. Include youths in your committees, task forces, and teams

Look for opportunities to include Interactors in leadership roles in your club and district. Invite Interactors to your district conferences and training events, where they learn alongside other leaders and can contribute to the broader conversation. At the international level, starting in July, Interactors will sit on a reimagined Youth Advisory Council, giving them the chance to have a voice on Rotary's youth programs.

3. Let them take the lead

It's by planning club meetings and service projects that Interactors gain lifelong skills in management, negotiation, and relationship building. So play the supporting role by volunteering at Interact events wherever they need help. Think about additional ways to help Interactors learn leadership skills, such as Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, district leadership events, and local training opportunities.

4. Watch out for "adultism"

Adults always know best ... or do they? Instead of assuming you know all the answers, be ready to ask questions and listen. Think about the respect you'd give another adult's viewpoints and ideas and treat a teen the same way. "Interact members bring fresh perspectives and creativity to projects. Their unique viewpoints, in addition to their tech know-how and capacity to think creatively, can assist in the creation of innovative and successful solutions. And Interact members may use their substantial social media presence to significantly increase awareness of Rotary projects, widening Rotary's influence and contributing to positive change in their communities."



THE CAÑAO EMBLEM

Our Official Club Bulletin has been called The Cañao. "Cañao" (pronounced as kan-yau) is actually the local term for the dance during native feasts or celebrations in the highlands of the Cordilleras- in Northern Luzon of the Philippines.

This is depicted in our Cañao emblem which shows a number of human figures in deep concentration absorbed in ritual dance.

The attention, focus, commitment and unity of the club's members is represented by the dancing figures—in celebration or expectation of a bountiful harvest; much as we actually do—in anticipation of the joy derived from public service to the communityalways coupled with fellowship. Hence, the sub-title of "A Celebration of Service."



THE RCB LOGO

The Rotary Club of Baguio (RCB) was chartered on 21 February 1938. The 4,587th member of Rotary International and the oldest club organized North of Manila; the 6th chartered Rotary Club in the entire Philippines.

Our over-simplified club logo (red) is a composite of the letters r, c & B; this is symbolic of the club's straightforwardness. Over-all cardiode-heart shape connotes that our members serve from the heart. The four basic elements (four quadrants— now 3D bevelled) are symbolic of Rotary's Four-Way Test and the members' commitment to it. Our charter year of 1938 is used as the mid-focal point of the logo, to emphasize our early beginnings and continuing dedication to
