Last May 13, 2022 was an engaging educational meeting with 3 brave and smart, youth speakers- Ivan Gajo, Jorina Bohol and Julie Pindug, tagged as the Team Mcdo, the team trained by PE Cora. They had a very good presentation on their researches, that were very interesting that almost made the meeting endless. Thank you PE Cora.

Today, may we welcome our Guest of Honor and Speaker, Ms Carmencita Lumiwan – Chaluyen, a Social Worker with the topic, Rehabilitation of Children in Conflict with the Law before Reintegration with their Family and Community.

On May 15 Monday, Gov Ann invited a rotarian, Rtn. Richard Laus from RC Tarlac who is an officer of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) in Tarlac Extension office. However, because of you our dear RC Baguio members' generosity and for acceding to my request to increase our TRF annual fund, we were able to get our share from Gov Ann's District Governor's Fund.

And the third project is the production of ergonomic helmet for emergency response. The students presented their project as if they were pitching their products to potential investors. They were knowledgeable of their project in that they were able to answer the questions of the Rotarians admirably.

After PP Mia Cawed gave the response, singing of the RCB Hymn and the Pilipinas Kong Mahal followed. The meeting was adjourned at 3:00pm.

Rotary service is the best public relations

As a public relations professional, my work involves building and maintaining relationships between organizations and their target audiences. On a personal level, working in public relations has opened my eyes to many beautiful moments. Life truly looks much richer through the lens of public relations.

Recently, I had the opportunity to witness the impact of our service project in the Municipality of Gabaldon, Nueva Ecija. The project provided help for 250 Katutubo (Indigenous) families, including 150 children. It was led by our club president, Shirley Dionisio, and members of the club implemented various aspects of the project in a single day.

The project included a talk on breastfeeding, life skills, and disaster preparedness, as well as basic literacy and education for children. The club distributed books, notebooks, and other learning materials as well as hygiene kits for children. To ensure access to clean water, water pipes were turned over to an Indigenous chieftain.

I was particularly moved by the distribution of food packs to the 250 families, containing four kilograms of rice, canned goods, noodles, and organic coffee. The club also set up a soup kitchen to feed more than 300 people and distributed clothing.

Beyond these tangible benefits, the club provided intangibles that were just as valuable: joy, hope, and inspiration. The smiles on the faces of the Katutubo families, especially the children who received the gifts, were priceless.

Witnessing this project was truly inspiring. It reminded me of the power of Rotary to create a positive impact in our communities. The Rotary Club of Cubao Edsa is using their skills, resources, and networks to create a brighter future for those in need. Behind every successful project, there are people who serve, inspire, and uplift others. I feel blessed to be surrounded by individuals who continually inspire me to do better, and be better, in every aspect of my life.

To change the world, start young

Since 1962, generations of young people have discovered the power of Service Above Self and — judging from the pages of this magazine over the decades — had some serious fun along the way.

1962

December

An article in the magazine entitled "The blueprint's ready for Interact" introduces Rotary's "new youth group," whose purpose, the article explains, is "to provide opportunity for young men [ages 15 to 18] to work together in a world fellowship dedicated to service and international understanding." The article goes on to outline the program's goals, which include developing constructive leadership and personal integrity, and encourage interested Rotary clubs to obtain an Interact Club Organizing Kit. As for the group's name, Interact — an amalgam of "international" and "action" — was selected from more than 200 suggestions, and "linguists agree, [it] translates clearly in almost every language spoken by Rotarians."

1963

February

In a letter to the magazine, Mississippi Rotarian Frank E. Cotton Jr. writes: "If Interact is as good as it appears,

I wonder if there is any justification for our seriously limiting its potential value by restricting it to young men. The article indicated no principle of Interact which would not apply as well, perhaps better, to clubs of boys and girls."

November

On its first anniversary, Interact numbers 177 clubs in 24 countries. That includes a club in Thanjavur, India, the first Interact club outside of the United States, with certification two months after the Melbourne club.

1964

September

With "deep satisfaction," RI President Charles W. Pettengill announces the first Interact Week, a forerunner of World Interact Week. "It is my hope that every Rotary club in the world will take advantage of the unique opportunity," he says, "... to focus attention on this dynamic youth program." The same issue reports that, in its most recent meetings, Rotary's Board of Directors requested district governors "to appoint district Interact advisory committees ... to assist the district governor in publicizing the Interact program, promoting the organization of new Interact clubs, and administering the program of Interact within the district."

1966

October

Ahead of Interact's fourth anniversary, RI President Richard L. Evans declares it "a Rotary success." With some 34,000 members in nearly 1,400 clubs and 51 countries, Interact, he says, "has enlisted the energy of youth in service and in international understanding."

1968

Rotary's Board of Directors expands Interact's horizons.

"Should local circumstances indicate to the sponsoring Rotary club that good cause would be served by the admission of girls, the sponsoring Rotary club is at liberty to use its discretion accordingly. Should the sponsoring club decide on a mixed membership, at least half should be boys."

1982

October

After 20 years, Interact's 90,000-plus members serve in 4,100 clubs situated in 78 countries. "Everyone is aware of problems in the world," says Diane Mezzich, a member of the Interact club at St. Mary's High School in Manhasset, New York. "It is a good feeling to know that we can do something positive through Interact."

1987

2002

A youthful 40 years old, Interact now has about 8,600 clubs in 107 countries. For this year's World Interact Week, those clubs and their Rotary sponsors are asked to give an inspiring presentation about Interact to a Rotary club that does not sponsor an Interact club or conduct a joint Rotary-Interact project to increase awareness of Interact.

2009

The Interact Video Awards are introduced. The grand prize winner is the Interact Club of Communities-in-Schools at the South Carolina Department of Juvenile Justice with a video entitled Giving Back Through Interact. In a surprise, two videos each win first prize: What Interact Means to Us from the Interact Club of Shoumen in Bulgaria and The World We Live In from the Interact Club of Edmonton Centennial, Alberta. In 2020, the video prize becomes a component of the more broadly themed Interact Awards, which also honor photos and essays.

2010

The minimum age for participation in Interact changes

from 14 to 12.

2013

2020

Rotary International approves an Interact Advisory Council; it will merge in July 2023 with a reimagined Youth Advisory Council.

2022

Imagine a Rotary where, in the next 60 years, youth voices and youth perspective lead the way."



THE CAÑAO EMBLEM

Our Official Club Bulletin has been called The Cañao. "Cañao" (pronounced as kan-yau) is actually the local term for the dance during native feasts or celebrations in the highlands of the Cordilleras- in Northern Luzon of the Philippines.

This is depicted in our Cañao emblem which shows a number of human figures in deep concentration—absorbed in ritual dance.

The attention, focus, commitment and unity of the club's members is represented by the dancing figures—in celebration or expectation of a bountiful harvest; much as we actually do—in anticipation of the joy derived from public service to the community-always coupled with fellowship. Hence, the sub-title of "A Celebration of Service."

THE RCB LOGO

The Rotary Club of Baguio (RCB) was chartered on 21 February 1938. The 4,587th member of Rotary International and the oldest club organized North of Manila; the 6th chartered Rotary Club in the entire Philippines.

Our over-simplified club logo (red) is a composite of the letters r, c & B; this is symbolic of the club's straightforwardness. Over-all cardiode-heart shape connotes that our members serve from the heart. The four basic elements (four quadrants— now 3D bevelled) are symbolic of Rotary's Four-Way Test and the members' commitment to it. Our charter year of 1938 is used as the mid-focal point of the logo, to emphasize our early beginnings and continuing dedication to

Service Above Self.
