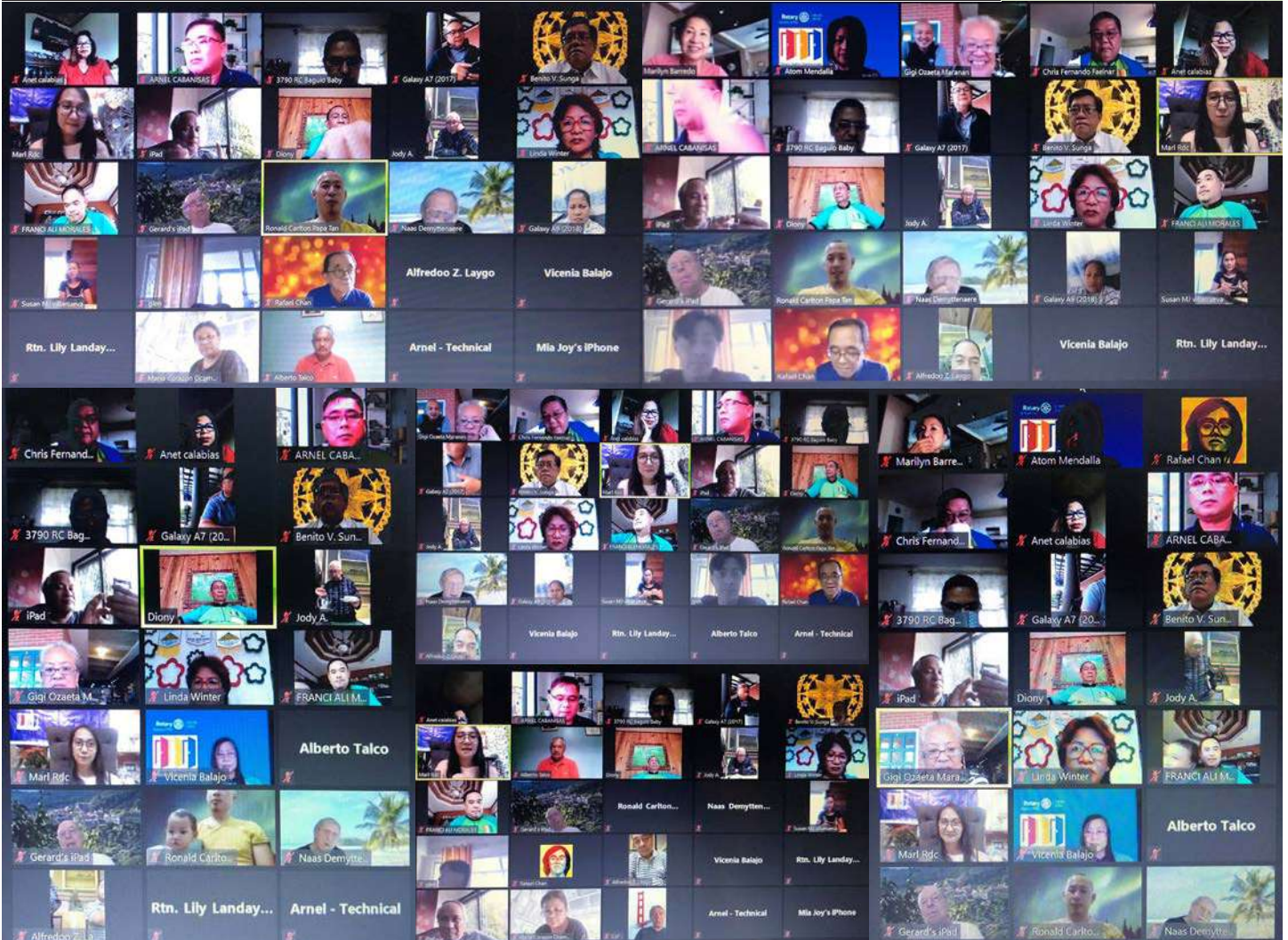

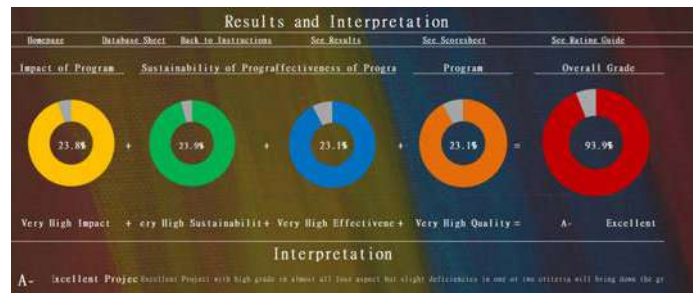

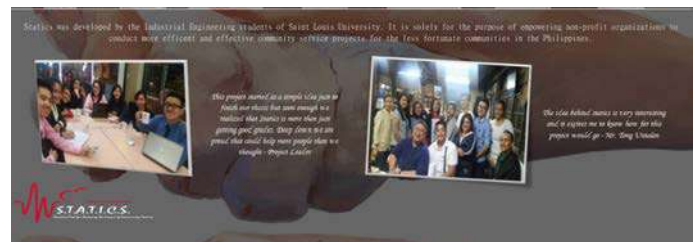

Developing the S.T.A.T.I.C.S.: A Systematic Tool For Evaluating Community Service Projects

Research Title

Introduction

A challenge for community service organizations nowadays is that while plenty of good things happen in their program it rarely gets captured. When the people involved move on, community service organizations such as the Rotary Club of Baguio are left without the knowledge to show that they really made an impact in the community they helped.

Objectives of the Study

The main objective espoused by this study is to develop the S.T.A.T.I.C.S. and design its components for systematically evaluating the impact of community service projects in order to empower not only Rotary Club but as well as other non-profit organization to have a more effective and efficient community service projects for the underserved communities.

The Problem

If non-profit organizations such as Rotary Club don't measure their impact, they risk not being able to demonstrate the effectiveness of their programs. They risk not being able to motivate the community by showing people that a difference their programs really make. They risk losing out on the opportunities to bring in more human and financial capital and so identify their strengths and weaknesses.

Significance of the Study

The significance of developing an impact evaluation tool for community organizations such as Rotary Club can be summarized in three aspects: namely Human and Financial Capital, Decision Making and Empowerment.

Giving you an example of what STATICS can do to evaluate our projects, consider the figure below showing results and interpretation of the feeding program we had before during the term of PP Chris Faelnar and was presented to the club. To have the results done, the user of this program must do an input of data and information so that whatever was inputted – will result to a certain value for impact of program, sustainability of program, effectiveness of the program and quality. The over-all rate will provide us an information if our programs or activities are good or the club will need to review and evaluate further so

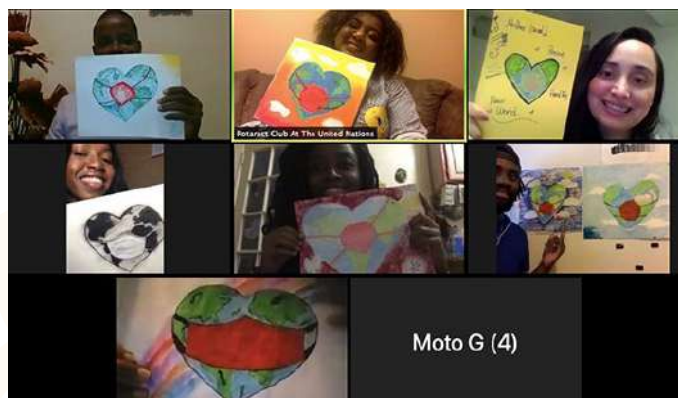

Instead of providing guests with the necessary art supplies in person, we encouraged our online guests to be creative about their choice of materials – from paper to T-shirts, to canvas. The same rule applied to mediums, with participants deciding to use paint, crayons, or even makeup. The limit was one's own imagination.

Our club provided the music and an online art instructor, who led participants through the process of creating a painting. Participants supplied their own beverage at home. We were determined to engage members of other Rotaract clubs, Rotary members, and guests for a night of fun.

I must say we were not sure how the event would turn out considering the fact we had never done a virtual event before. But embracing the challenge, we were pleasantly surprised with the results. We had guests sign up and pay a registration fee from all over our district and beyond. We mingled with other Rotaractors, Rotarians, and guests, and shared some laughs at our different levels of artistic talent.

The event opened our eyes to the ability to serve our community and still have fun, all within the restraints of social distancing. The money we raised will support our upcoming community service projects including distributing food to frontline healthcare workers, and making and distributing personal protective equipment.

Event Highlights How Rotary Members can Help Refugees

Refugees and Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) are among the most vulnerable people on earth. The latest UNHCR report released ahead of World Refugee Day in June estimates that 79.5 million people were forcibly displaced in 2019. Sadly, the number keeps rising as conflict and economic crises force people out of their home. Syria still has the largest number of refugees globally, but displacement is also affecting millions of people in Venezuela and Central America, generating major economic and civilian challenges for the Latin America region as a whole.

On 23 June, with the help of Rotarians Rich Carson and Lara Bersano among others, the Rotary Club of Washington Global and the Organization of American States (OAS) organized an event to draw attention to the refugee crisis in Latin America. Speakers included Luis Almagro, Secretary General of the OAS, Claudia Blum de Barberi, Minister for Foreign Affairs of Colombia, Alexandra Hill, Minister of Foreign Affairs of El Salvador, Diego Beltrand, Special Envoy for the International Organization of Migration, and John Hewko, General Secretary of Rotary International. In addition, a panel with representatives from the private sector and civil society featured Ingo Ploger, President of the Business Council of Latin America, and Cristal Montañéz, a

Rotarian from Houston who implemented the Hope for Venezuelans Project in Colombia. Watch a recording of the event.

As a Rotarian, I was especially impressed by the work Cristal Montañéz is doing with Venezuelan refugees that have poured into Colombia over the last several years. With support from Rise Against Hunger, she has provided nearly 650,000 meals to refugees. This is just a start: she has recently received additional funding to continue her project.

Her story, as well as many other Rotary members who have led projects providing relief and creating opportunities for refugees globally, is captured in a report our club prepared ahead of the event with the OAS. The report, available on our website, shows in practical ways how Rotary members and other people of action can alleviate the suffering of refugees and invest in their future.

What are the next steps? One of the ideas following the event is to explore the feasibility of creating a Rotary Action Group (RAG) on refugees to help clubs and districts globally implement projects in support of refugees and IDPs. The number of refugees is expected to increase in the next few decades in part due to displacement caused by global warming. So there will be plenty of work to do.

Also, people with many different types of expertise can help refugees, since they need support in virtually all areas of their life, from education and employment to health and access to water and sanitation. We expect that many Rotary members may be both able and interested in providing support.

We have not decided whether to submit a proposal for a RAG to the Rotary International Board of Directors, for their approval. But if you are interested in the idea, please fill out a short survey or send an email to Quentin Wodon at rotarianeconomist@gmail.com. We plan to hold a zoom meeting on 11 July to brainstorm.

1. Honest

3. Inspiring
4. Competent

The authors of the Book “True North” Bill George & Peter Sims came up with some very interesting conclusions as to what they consider as Authentic Leadership.

The authors say that Authentic leaders are those who not only Inspire with their Charisma but also Empower those they lead. TWO very crucial words, INSPIRE & EMPOWER.

5 dimensions that make an Authentic Leader;

- First is passion and a guiding VISION.
- The Second dimension is the practice of solid values: Most of all Integrity.
- The Third dimension to be an authentic leader is to have a HEART.
- The fourth dimension is establishing Enduring Relationships.
- The Fifth dimension is having Self-Discipline to produce RESULTS.

True leaders empower others to action – it is a TRANSFORMATION from I to WE and US. It is about motivating people to reach their full potential and bringing out their BEST.

ITS ABOUT TEAM WORK.

12 Things the Great Leaders Do....

1. Good leaders Make PEOPLE their top priority
2. Lead by Example
3. Leaders must be relentless in giving the vision that THE TEAM will aspire for.
4. Leaders need to hire the BEST people.
5. Leaders must see to it that the teams are compensated fairly and share adequate resources.
6. Leaders cannot motivate teams unless they treat each individual with RESPECT.
7. Leaders must TRUST and RESPECT their people
8. A good leader Informs, Shares and Listens.
9. Encourage and Support the Learning of your team.
10. GOOD LEADERS need to measure what's important. Feedback is crucial and critical for success.
11. LEADERS also must help build a culture of success and celebration in their teams and organization. RECOGNIZE AND CELEBRATE
They must be leaders and Champions of Change and Innovation for the Better
 - Decisive
 - Curious
 - Innovative
 - Champions of Change and be open to itOne of a Leader's most important tasks Is to Coach and Teach his people. Mentoring Future Leaders is one of the most important roles of any Leader.
12. It is important that a Leader takes a break. A Leader should always find time to retreat, relax, reflect, review and recharge.

In the book by Warren Bennis of “Becoming A Leader”, Bennis elaborates the difference between a Manager and a Leader.
 - a. The MANAGER administers; the LEADER innovates.
 - b. The MANAGER is a copy; the LEADER is an original.
 - c. The MANAGER maintains; the LEADER develops.
 - d. The MANAGER focuses on Systems and Structure; the LEADER focuses on People.
 - e. The MANAGER relies on Control; the LEADER Inspires Trust.
 - f. The MANAGER has a Short-Range View; the LEADER has a Long-Range Perspective.
 - g. The MANAGER asks How and When; the LEADER asks What and Why.

- h. The MANAGER has his or her eye always on the bottom line; the LEADER'S eye is on the Horizon.
- i. The MANAGER imitates; the LEADER Originates.

- k. The MANAGER is the classic good soldier; the LEADER is his or her own person.
- l. The MANAGER does things Right; the LEADER does the Right thing.

Still from the same book, Warren Bennis writes that the next generation of LEADERS must have certain things in common and they are;

- A Broad Education.
- Boundless Curiosity
- Boundless Enthusiasm / Passion
- Contagious Optimism
- Belief in People and Teamwork
- Willing to Take Risks
- Devotion to long term growth rather than short term profit
- Commitment to Excellence
- Adaptive Capacity
- Empathy
- Authenticity
- Integrity
- Vision

Some short points on what Worldwide Survey says of the Characteristics of Admired Leaders;

- Ambitious – Aspiring; Hardworking
- Broad-Minded – Open-Minded; Flexible
- Caring – Appreciative; Compassionate; Concerned
- Competent – Professional; Capable
- Cooperative – Team Player
- Courageous – Bold; daring
- Dependable – Reliable; responsible
- Determined – Dedicated and Persistent
- Fair – Just; Objective; Forgiving
- Forward-Looking – Visionary; Sense of Direction
- Honest – Truthful; With Integrity
- Imaginative – Creative; Curious; Innovative
- Inspiring – Energetic; Humorous; Positive; Cheerful
- Loyal – Faithful; Devoted
- Mature – Wise

- Supportive – Helpful; Always Offers Assistance
- Integrity – is what creates Real Leaders – It is the foundation to build business success; and the relationship with all stakeholders. Reputation and Brand is what ultimately will determine your winning competitive legacy and record.

A true leader need not be a SUPERSTAR but one who can efficiently motivate and effectively get people to work together harmoniously and efficiently to produce best results. He is like, to a large extent, a CONDUCTOR of an ORCHESTRA who chooses the best musicians, trains and hones their talents, and then motivates them to excel and work harmoniously together. All these put together lead them to come up with their BEST PERFORMANCE ever. It is also believed that leaders need to show up at work places or company events, whether it to be an employee recognition night, a summer picnic, or whatever company or organizational event because doing so means a lot to the employees or members.

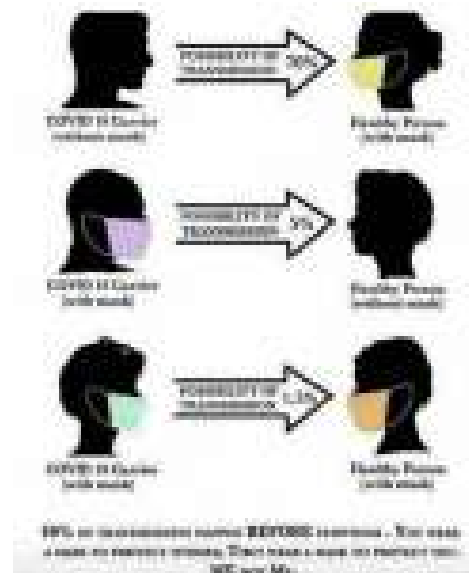

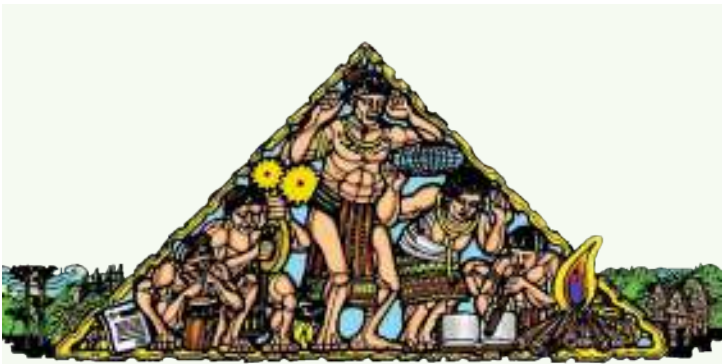

Our Official Club Bulletin has been called The Cañao. “Cañao” (pronounced as kan-yau) is actually the local term for the dance during native feasts or celebrations in the highlands of the Cordilleras- in Northern Luzon of the Philippines.

This is depicted in our Cañao emblem which shows a number of human figures in deep concentration—absorbed in ritual dance.

The attention, focus, commitment and unity of the club’s members is represented by the dancing figures—in celebration or expectation of a bountiful harvest; much as we actually do—in anticipation of the joy derived from public service to the community—always coupled with fellowship. Hence, the sub-title of “A Celebration of Service.”

The Rotary Club of Baguio (RCB) was chartered on 21 February 1938. The 4,587th member of Rotary International and the oldest club organized North of Manila; the 6th chartered Rotary Club in the entire Philippines.

Our over-simplified club logo (red) is a composite of the letters r, c & B; this is symbolic of the club’s straightforwardness. Over-all cardiode-heart shape connotes that our members serve from the heart. The four basic elements (four quadrants—now 3D bevelled) are symbolic of Rotary’s Four-Way Test and the members’ commitment to it. Our charter year of 1938 is used as the mid-focal point of the logo, to emphasize our early beginnings and continuing dedication to

Service Above Self.
