The 80/20 Principle





This is also known as the PARETO PRINCIPLE and can be used by every individual person in their daily lives, by every organization such as Rotary Club of Baguio and in any type of organization.




How the 80/20 Principle has helped me



I remember myself applying this principle in one of the ways to manage inventory in a warehouse, this principle helped not only me but all people and resources in the area. Pareto made me identify what is important and what is not, to separate what must be done first to make all the work done at fast as I could and to identify which among the activities will have greater impact in my area and even the lives of people under me.

Do you agree with the following statement?

- "Who you work for is more important than what you do,"
- "Wealth from investment can dwarf wealth from working,"



20% of what you do leads to 80% of your results.

Do the 20% that matters and forget the rest.

80/20 Analysis examines the relationship between two sets of comparable data. One set of data is always a universe of people or objects, usually a large number of 100 or more, that can be turned into a percentage. The other set of data relates to some interesting characteristics of the people or objects that can be measured and also turned into a percentage.

Why is it called 80/20 analysis?

When comparing these relationships, the most frequent


The 80/20 Principle (cont.)

observation, made long ago was that 80 percent of the quantity being measured came from 20 percent of the people or objects. 80/20 has become shorthand for this type of unbalanced relationship, whether or not the precise result is 80/20.

Examples

- 20% of clients provide 80% of the profit (cherish them getting new clients is hard)
- 20% of clients make 80% of the trouble (these are usually not the profitable 20% fire them!)
- 20% of solutions provide 80% of the results
- 20% of product features/apps get used 80% of the time
- 20% of your time supplies 80% of your productivity

Here are 5 ways to apply 80/20 rule to real life:



1. Settings goals

When people set too many goals, and you ask them to chop them down they become infuriated. They think setting too many goals can help them to achieve more. Setting too many can lead to lack of focus and unhappiness. When setting goals, I suggest we write many of them down and prune them with few questions. We then discover that 80% of our goals are not worth pursuing. Here are few questions I ask myself when setting goals:

- How important is the goal?
- What is the reward for the goal?

- What is the minimum attainment time?
- How will the goal affect all areas of my life?
- Do I have the necessary resources?

2. Our relationships

Some people think having more friends can lead to more happiness and fulfilment. No! Believe me I've been into this before. Keeping few friends with the same mindset (20% of friends are instrumental to 80% of happiness and fulfilment). Whenever we meet with friends who are discouraging or doesn't support our goals (we must do away with them proto!) Life is too short to keep friends who will make us unhappy.

3. Our businesses

Yes, this is one of the most useful application of the 80/20 rule. 20% of our activities will bring 80% of rewards. As business people we may be tempted to keep every products, customers and activities. It's always better to shed 80% and keep the vital 20%. To earn the highest reward. It may involve hard decision like: keeping few of our products.

4. When saving money:

We can apply the 80/20 rule when preparing our budget. If we check our bud-

get well many of the items are not really important (I can testify!) We want to have this and that but we must leave only the really important items.

5. Saving time

We must watch our time. It is important to know that we can have more of most commodities, but not time. You can't rewind it (except in science fictions and fantasies). It is necessary to know that we can optimize our time. We must attend to only really important things and shun all time wasting activities.

So, what is your 80/20?

My miracle and ending modern slavery

I will never forget the miracle that changed my life. I call it a miracle because the sheer chance of it happening is close to zero.

I was living in Bagamoyo, Tanzania, at the time supporting the establishment of a new science university for a local Catholic church. There was a small museum next to the university that tells the story of the town's role as a major port and central hub during the slave trade centuries ago. I have always had a passion for helping the vulnerable and deprived, and had secured master's degree offers from some of the best International Development programs in the world. But my family and I lacked the resources for me to pursue an advanced degree.

Some 10,000 kilometers away, a Rotarian in Taiwan replied to my email seeking help obtaining a scholarship. It had been forwarded several times. He said that he was impressed by my experience and dream, and would assist me in finding a potential scholarship. Tears were in my eyes when I read his words.

Within a few weeks of receiving the email, I received a Rotary Global Grant Scholarship, covering not only tuition fee but also cost of living. Grateful is not enough to describe my feeling at the time. I thanked every Rotarian who made my Master's degree possible, and I thank God for the miracle.

I started my master's degree in Development Studies in the world's best-ranked program, the Institute of Development Studies (IDS) at the University of Sussex. With

classmates from more than 50 countries, this diverse and inclusive environment constantly blew my mind and widened my horizons. The experience transformed me, and gave me global skills that I am confident will help me contribute to making the world a better place.

While I was pursuing my degree, my knowledge about Rotary grew. I met the kindest and most inspiring individuals in my sponsor and host club. They are able to balance their career and home life all while living life to the fullest. After volunteering on several service projects, I saw how they dedicate their time to the community and good cause and knew I wanted to be a Rotarian one day.

Ending modern slavery

After graduation, I started working as an independent consultant for organizations like the International Labor Organization and Seafood Slavery Risk Tool, specialising on ending modern slavery. Modern slavery is an atrocity that I believe the world has the moral duty to fight against. Unfortunately, it doesn't get the attention it needs. There are a whopping 40 million people today in modern slavery, including situations like human trafficking, forced labor, and forced marriage. I worked with government agencies, NGOs, and academia, contributing to the investigation of human slavery and helping shape policy. I also founded a consultancy company that is a social enterprise, Humanity Research Consultancy, aiming to train and bring more consultants from developing countries to work on this issue.

Rotary Action Group Against Slavery (RAGAS) was the natural place for me to connect with others passionate about this issue. When I first learned about the group, I thought about the verse in the Bible (Romans 8:28) that says God works all things for good. Rotary not only provided the scholarship to empower me with skills and knowledge that I use, but it's also one of the pioneers on fighting against modern slavery. How amazing.

In 2020, I started to serve as a coordinator and board member for RAGAS, and it has allowed me to stand with a group of beautiful human beings who are also passionate about this cause. Collaboration is what makes us stronger, and I believe that ending slavery is a milestone that Rotary can help achieve, together.

High-speed internet isn't a luxury; it's essential for a 21st-century education

A Rotary club in Denver, Colorado, USA helped expand the information highway to reach all the state's kids

When it comes to global issues, access to high-speed internet might not seem to be a high priority. But when a community lacks internet access, its economy can suffer as residents deal with limited educational and employment opportunities.

"Internet access is essential for rural communities," says Christopher Mitchell, director of the Community Broadband Network Initiative, a program of the Institute for Local Self-Reliance, a research and advocacy organization. "In some ways it's even more important than for cities. The two things that immediately come to mind are education and jobs," he says. Homework options are limited without internet access in the home, he explains, "and employers are looking to put their jobs in places that have good internet access. Towns that have slow internet access are generally shrinking."

Rotary clubs address internet inequality

In 2010, as the Rotary Club of Denver neared its 100th anniversary, members started thinking about a project to mark the event. Club member John Klug recalls that "we kept asking ourselves what we could do that 100 years from now, at our 200th anniversary, someone might look back at and say, 'Wow. What they did was amazing; it truly made a difference."

Roland Thornton, then the club's president and an executive at telecommunications company Qwest Communications, knew that many rural schools lacked the high-speed internet access common in urban ones, putting their students at a disadvantage. "There are countries in Asia," Thornton remembers thinking, "that have a considerably larger broadband footprint than the United States. I was trying to make us more competitive from a global perspective. My focus was on those rural schools."

Thornton heard about an organization called the Eagle-Net Alliance (which stands for Educational Access Gateway Learning Environment Network), a coalition of public and private groups that also wanted to bring high-speed internet to the far corners of Colorado. At the time, the state considered itself a tech hub, but in terms of broadband connectivity, it was among the lowest-ranked in the nation. In some rural areas, in-

ternet costs were 10 times higher than in Denver. Eagle-Net had applied for a federal grant from the government's broadband stimulus program, but the application had been denied. So the Rotary Club of Denver took on the challenge.

The club helped Eagle-Net reapply for the grant. Members started an online petition and put together a YouTube video. The video emphasized that this was a bipartisan issue, featuring endorsements from former Senator Hank Brown, a Republican, and former Governor Dick Lamm, a Democrat. They got school boards, local officials, and business groups involved to show community support. The second application was successful, and Eagle-Net received a \$100.6 million grant to start extending the Colorado information highway to reach all the state's kids.

Inching closer to equal internet access

When the COVID-19 pandemic shut down classrooms earlier this year, students without broadband internet found themselves at a huge disadvantage as schools moved to online instruction. But Silverton, Colorado, an isolated mountain town of 700 people, had been connected by Eagle-Net to fiber-optic cable — which proved to be a lifeline.

"We were able to keep all our kids connected," says Kim White, superintendent of Silverton schools. "We had 100 percent of our kids continue to participate. We were able to do physical education classes, after-school programming, and counseling sessions online. There were lots and lots of opportunities. If we hadn't had that connection, it would have been paper and pencil packets."

Eagle-Net installed more than 720 miles of new fiber-optic line. With over 250 miles of existing network upgraded and about 2,000 miles of new network lines leased from other companies, the project is providing connections to 126 "community anchor institutions" such as schools, libraries, and nonprofit health care providers across Colorado. And of the state's 178 school districts, only 12 schools still are not adequately built out to take advantage of high-speed fiber-optic connections.

"Eagle-Net had a tremendous impact on our school," White says. "We didn't have the capacity to have multiple kids on multiple computers online at the same time. We couldn't stream. We had the equipment to do videoconferencing, but we didn't have the access. It's opened up new worlds to us."

Our Official Club Bulletin has been called The Cañao. "Cañao" (pronounced as kan-yau) is actually the local term for the dance during native feasts or celebrations in the highlands of the Cordilleras- in Northern Luzon of the Philippines.

This is depicted in our Cañao emblem which shows a number of human figures in deep concentration—absorbed in ritual dance.

The attention, focus, commitment and unity of the club's members is represented by the dancing figures—in celebration or expectation of a bountiful harvest; much as we actually do—in anticipation of the joy derived from public service to the community—always coupled with fellowship. Hence, the sub-title of "A Celebration of Service."

The Rotary Club of Baguio (RCB) was chartered on 21 February 1938. The 4,587th member of Rotary International and the oldest club organized North of Manila; the 6th chartered Rotary Club in the entire Philippines.

Our over-simplified club logo (red) is a composite of the letters r, c & B; this is symbolic of the club's straightforwardness. Over-all cardiode-heart shape connotes that our members serve from the heart. The four basic elements (four quadrants—now 3D bevelled) are symbolic of Rotary's Four-Way Test and the members' commitment to it. Our charter year of 1938 is used as the mid-focal point of the logo, to emphasize our early beginnings and continuing dedication to
