



RI President-elect Jennifer Jones announces Rotary's \$97 million pledge for sustainable projects

The star-studded global event rallied people to take action on some of the world's most urgent problems

Rotary International President-elect Jennifer Jones took the stage at the Global Citizen Live concert on 25 September in Paris, France, and pledged \$97 million in grant funding from the organization next year for sustainable, Rotary club-led projects.

Global Citizen Live, a 24-hour broadcast with events and performances across six continents, aimed to unite people to take action to defend the planet, end the COVID-19 pandemic, defeat poverty, provide education for all children, and promote equity and justice for all. Some of the world's top artists, celebrities, activists, and government leaders participated in this year's event to raise awareness and support in cities including Paris; Lagos, Nigeria; London, UK; Los Angeles, USA; New York City, USA; Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; Seoul, Korea; and Sydney, Australia.

In Paris, where Jones pledged Rotary's support, thousands of people gathered at the iconic Champ de Mars near the Eiffel Tower to see performances from Elton John, Ed Sheeran, Black Eyed Peas, Christine and the Queens, Doja Cat, Angélique

Kidjo, and more. Other leaders pledging support included European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, French President Emmanuel Macron, and Paris Mayor Anne Hidalgo.

"Every day millions of girls walk miles to fetch clean water, and millions of boys are on the streets instead of going to school. Every day moms and dads struggle to find ways to feed their children," Jones said from the main stage in Paris. "And every day, members of Rotary and Global Citizen start our days knowing that we can make a difference."

"This year we're putting a special focus on empowering girls worldwide, opening doors for young women to build brighter futures," Jones said. "Today Rotary is committed to helping end poverty globally and protecting the planet by pledging \$97 million in grant funding during 2022 for sustainable, member-led projects."

She added: "We stand together with Global Citizen as people of purpose, people of action."

Rotary has worked with Global Citizen for a more than decade, primarily regarding the effort to eradicate polio worldwide. At the 2012 Global Citizen event in New York City, Rotary General Secretary John Hewko and celebrity ambassador Archie Panjabi announced Rotary's \$75 million commitment to polio eradication. Rotary and Global Citizen have also connected at Rotary International Conventions, the Commonwealth Heads of Governments Meetings, polio advocacy events, and polio funding announcements.

In total, more than \$1.1 billion in commitments, 157 million trees to be planted, and 60 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines to be donated to developing countries were announced in conjunction with the 25 September event.

Smile and celebrate the small wins in DEI

Editor's Note: In September 2020, Rotary formed a task force charged with assessing the current status of diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) in Rotary and shaping a comprehensive action plan to help us further value and live those principles throughout the organization. This is the third in a series of blog posts from DEI Task Force members reflecting on their work on the committee and why it is critical for the organization.



Dr. "Bowtie" Todd Jenkins serves as a Global Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Leader at a Fortune 100 company in Corporate America and as an Executive Inclusion Trainer, Strategist, and Speaker with Bowtie Leadership, Inc. Todd is a member of the Rotary Club of Fayetteville, Arkansas; and has served as a Rotaract Advisor, Interact Sponsor, RYLA presenter, and Youth Services Chair. He is currently one of the youngest Youth Exchange District chairs in Rotary. Rotary. Read his full bio.

Q: You have worked with companies like Walmart, Google, Facebook, American Airlines and Kellogg's. What can Rotary learn from these companies in regard to DEI?

Dr. Jenkins: There is no one right way or one size fits all to DEI work. As individuals and as an organization, we must understand that we are all on a journey. What I will say about these big companies is they have done a great job understanding the business case for DEI— that the most-diverse companies are more likely than ever to outperform less-diverse peers. They are taking business risks that reflect their commitment to DEI and are not waiting for a government to regulate what they already know are the right steps to take. They are using their power for good, to activate communities and amplify diverse voices. Rotary must use its network and connections to continue to activate an inclusive growth mindset and be something the world hasn't seen before, one where inclusion is at the core of everything we think, say or do. It is going to be rewarding, exciting, and even scary – but we can do it. Diversity and inclusion are essential to our impact today and the future – of Rotary and the next-generation leaders

Q: You speak to clubs and districts all over the Rotary world—are there frequent questions you hear, and how do you address them?

Dr. Jenkins: There are certainly some common themes, and we spent a lot of time outlining solutions in the <u>Accountability + Inclusion webinar series</u> over the past Rotary year.

1) Where do we start? This is a great first question to ask. It is vital to assess your community, where you are at and understand where you wish to go. Then most importantly, build a plan to get there and live out your plan in behaviors and actions. Here is a great resource to get you started.

- 2) How do we connect with diverse communities? This one should be so easy for Rotary because it is all about building relationships—authentic relationships! Get to know people who are different from you and partner with marginalized communities through service projects or meaningful events. Ask brave questions to learn about how their experiences are different from yours, build bridges that connect them with Rotary and vice versa.
- 3) How do we get buy-in? This is where it is so important to make sure that DEI efforts extend to all activities and involve everyone. It should not exist in a vacuum or as a one-time effort. Make sure there is a commitment to the work at the highest levels of the club and district, and if you can make sure all the goals have measurable results!
- Q: What is the most challenging thing for people to understand about DEI work?

Dr. Jenkins: There are two things. One is that a club can be diverse without being inclusive, and that is a real risk if inclusion is not a priority. Inclusion efforts must be at the center of our values and actions. The second is understanding the difference between equality and equity, and why we focus on equity. Equality is giving everyone, regardless of circumstance, the same access, and opportunities. Equity compels us to remove the structural barriers that exist for people to access opportunity and acknowledges that what people need to thrive varies from person to person. Here is one way to visualize it.

Q: As more clubs and districts work to set up specific committees to work on DEI, what advice do you have for them?

Dr. Jenkins: Don't shy away from having hard conversations, but make sure you are able to answer these two questions: 1) Whom will this conversation benefit? 2) What are we looking to accomplish? We all come to this work and efforts differently, so we need to create spaces to listen and ask tough questions around representation, culture, systems, policies, programs, etc., while avoiding the tendency toward shame and blame, or debate versus dialogue. I have learned to practice curiosity with compassion related to different views and perspectives looking to understand. The more we practice these conversations, the better we will become.

Q: How optimistic are you for the future of diversity, equity, and inclusion within Rotary?

Dr. Jenkins: Hope is all we have, and it is part of why I believe Rotary is ready to do the work. Rotary gives hope every day in communities around the world. Also, this work and commitment is not always meant to be exhausting. Yes, you will have challenging times, conversations, and people you may come in contact with. However, I have seen in my profession, that small changes in the DEI work can make a big difference and you should celebrate the small wins. COVID-19 has taught us many lessons around gratitude and so much more, so don't forget to smile and enjoy the process of doing the right thing!

We did as instructed.

You went from pocket to pocket, and when you went through my pocket, you found the watch and took it. You kept searching everyone's pockets, and when you were done you said 'open your eyes. We have the watch.'

You didn't tell on me and you never mentioned the episode. You never said who stole the watch either. That day you saved my dignity forever. It was the most shameful day of my life.

But this is also the day I decided not to become a thief, a bad person, etc. You never said anything, nor did you even scold me or take me aside to give me a moral lesson.

I received your message clearly.

Thanks to you, I understood what a real educator needs to do.

Do you remember this episode, professor?

The old professor answered, 'Yes, I remember the situation with the stolen watch, which I was looking for in everyone's pocket. I didn't remember you, because I also closed my eyes while looking.'

This is the essence of teaching:

If to correct you must humiliate; you don't know how to teach."



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THE CAÑAO EMBLEM

Our Official Club Bulletin has been called The Cañao. "Cañao" (pronounced as kan-yau) is actually the local term for the dance during native feasts or celebrations in the highlands of the Cordilleras- in Northern Luzon of the Philippines.

This is depicted in our Cañao emblem which shows a number of human figures in deep concentration—absorbed in ritual dance.

The attention, focus, commitment and unity of the club's members is represented by the dancing figures—in celebration or expectation of a bountiful harvest; much as we actually do—in anticipation of the joy derived from public service to the community-always coupled with fellowship. Hence, the sub-title of "A Celebration of Service."

THE RCB LOGO

The Rotary Club of Baguio (RCB) was chartered on 21 February 1938. The 4,587th member of Rotary International and the oldest club organized North of Manila; the 6th chartered Rotary Club in the entire Philippines.

Our over-simplified club logo (red) is a composite of the letters r, c & B; this is symbolic of the club's straightforwardness. Over-all cardiode-heart shape connotes that our members serve from the heart. The four basic elements (four quadrants— now 3D bevelled) are symbolic of Rotary's Four-Way Test and the members' commitment to it. Our charter year of 1938 is used as the mid-focal point of the logo, to emphasize our early beginnings and continuing dedication to

Service Above Self.
