Triple B tramline

5 CR in different schools and other matching grants c/o PP Gerard as follows:

1. MG 60459 for braille embosser for visual impaired children (16,000 USD);
2. MG for water system at Luding, 18,000 USD;
3. MG 64541 for 10 computers with earphone and monitor, 13,500 USD;
4. MG 69849 for 10,000 booklets for hearing impaired children 19,975 USD;
5. MG 72229 for mobile health clinic 30,168 USD;
6. MG 73858 for ultra sound machine 7007 USD;
7. MG 74048 for medical equipment 15,139 USD;
8. MG 76477 for math box for visual impaired children 16,300 USD;
9. MG 78937 for van of itogon elementary school 33,000 USD;
10. MG 79263 for 30 computers for Poyopoy Elementary School and Taloy Sur Elementary School. Also, RC Sunrise for hearing impaired children elementary school for deaf children in Military Cut Off 18,000 USD.

They also discussed the present ongoing project with regards to water system in kabayan. The gurus also challenged the young/new rotation if they are interested to learn the process of applying global grant and they are willing to teach them.

Finally, during open forum some talked about the sustainability of the projects and if the other projects are still existing. Discussion went on to how can we improve and monitor our future projects. 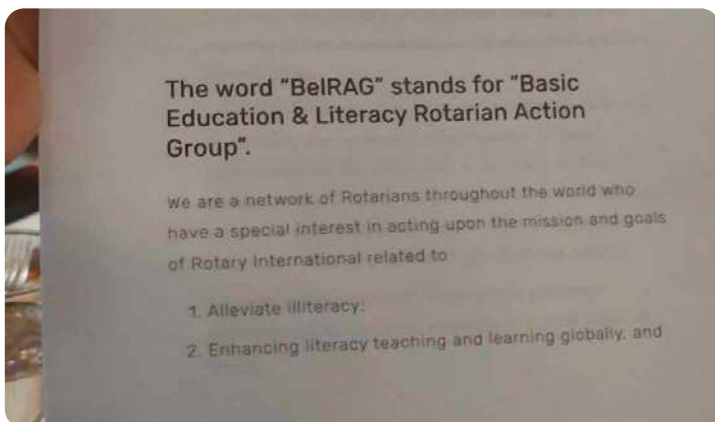

Rotary projects around the globe - November 2023

United States



After a 2021 tornado and subsequent electrical fire damaged the African American Museum in Bowling Green, Kentucky, a Rotary club in the city acquired a \$10,000 disaster relief grant from District 6710 to help restore the museum. But “we didn’t just want to be handing out the check,” says Vickie Elrod, a past president of the Rotary Club of Bowling Green. “We wanted to get boots on the ground to get involved with the preservation of those artifacts.” About a dozen Rotarians attended workshops on archiving, and the club is assisting the museum in digitizing documents. They include records on Shake Rag, a once-vibrant district settled by former slaves and soldiers who fought for the Union in the Civil War. The financial assistance enabled the museum to work with a conservator on preserving its uniforms and other clothes. The museum reopened in August, and Rotarians continue to assist with cleaning damaged artifacts, pictures, and equipment.

Jamaica

Advocates in Jamaica highlight a shortage of housing that meets the needs of people with limited mobility. The Rotary Club of Kingston funded a nearly \$23,000 refurbishment of Cheshire Village, a transitional housing facility associated with a rehabilitation center. “Rotarians were instrumental and involved in the three town halls we had with residents,” says Karsten Johnson, the club’s immediate past president. “Our plans were made based on their priorities.” The Kingston club, supported by donations from the Rotary Club of Naples North, Florida, raised the height of toilets and added support bars and railings along restroom walls. The club installed new kitchen cupboards, sinks, and faucets to improve accessibility for people who use wheelchairs. A first phase, to install six solar streetlights, was completed in February, with the retrofit finished in June.



Portugal



The Rotary Club of Almancil International takes an active approach in its mission to serve children, notably those with autism spectrum disorders or Down syndrome. Members sponsor activities including surfing lessons and animal therapy. In June the club

unveiled a sensory room at a school to serve students ages 5 to 16. “The room is now complete, with state-of-the-art equipment including a soothing waterbed, music, and many sensory light and tactile objects,” says club member Peter Hinze, who coordinated the project. “[It] can provide a sense of calm and help improve [students’] visual and auditory skills and help regulate their behavior.” The project cost more than \$16,000. The club provided about \$5,000, with businesses and friends donating the remainder.



Belgium

The Rotary Club of Virton en Gaume organized two days of concerts to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the Coralpins Gaumais, a trio that plays the traditional alphorn, a wooden horn once used by shepherds in the Alps. More than 140 alphornists, flag throwers, and bell ringers in folk costume participated in the event in May. The event raised money for the club’s charitable causes. The alphorn was the ideal instrument for harmoniously bringing together nature and the people who live in the region, says Jean-Marie Henin, a past club president. The club was inspired to put on the concert series after it organized visits by the Coralpins Gaumais to nursing homes and other care facilities during the COVID-19 pandemic.



Sri Lanka

While sea turtles can live to be more than 100 years old, as few as 1 in 10,000 survive to adulthood, according to some experts. Five of the world’s seven sea turtle species visit Sri Lanka, but poaching for food and shells, along with disruption caused by recreation, imperils the creatures. The Rotaract Club of CINEC at the Colombo International Nautical and Engineering College in Malabe organized a public webinar to raise awareness of the vulnerability of turtles, coral, and other sea life. Then in April the club offered the marine reptiles a leg up with an overnight operation to move turtle eggs out of harm’s way. More than two dozen Rotaractors met at Rekawa Beach near Tangalle to help transport about 350 eggs to a conservation center for safe hatching. They worked by the light of cellophane-covered lamps to avoid disturbing the light-sensitive turtles. “We were shown by experts how to carefully dig around the nest to expose and collect the eggs,” project chair Monalee Dissanayake says.

Uniting for hope: Interactors provide flood relief in Bangladesh

The monsoon season had wreaked havoc in Sylhet City, Bangladesh, leaving behind a trail of destruction and despair. The once-quaint villages were submerged under the relentless downpour, and the lives of thousands hung in the balance. As my Rotary district's Interact representative, I found myself at the center of a whirlwind of emotions and challenges with a deep-seated desire to make a difference.

Our mission was clear – to extend a helping hand to the flood-affected families in the region. With a group of passionate [Interactors](#) by my side in July of 2022, we embarked on a journey that would leave an indelible mark on our hearts and reaffirm the power of collective action.

It all began with a meeting, where we discussed the situation in Sylhet. Floodwaters had ravaged homes, destroyed crops, and left families struggling to make ends meet. Interact members were quick to respond. We knew that we couldn't stand idly by as our fellow citizens suffered.

The first hurdle was sourcing the necessary funds to execute our plan. We organized fundraising events from my Interact Club of Dhaka Paramount, reached out to local businesses, and even started an online campaign. The response was overwhelming. A total of 63 Interact clubs participated in fundraising. The community rallied behind us, demonstrating that, in times of crisis, compassion and unity shine the brightest. The Rotaract Club of Dhaka Orchid and Rotary Club of Dhaka also supported us in this initiative.

The process of raising funds was an eye-opener for many of us. We learned the value of perseverance, teamwork, and community engagement. The generosity of those who contributed served as a reminder that people are inherently good, and the power of collective action is immeasurable.

With the funds secured, the next challenge was planning the logistics of the relief mission. We collaborated with Rotaract clubs, local organizations, and Rotary clubs to ensure that our efforts were well-coordinated. The enthusiasm of the Interactors and Rotaractors was palpable as they took on various roles, from liaising with authorities to organizing food packaging and transportation.

Despite the rain, we carried on with unwavering determination. The resilience of the Interactors was truly inspiring. Together, we felt the weight of responsibility on our shoulders but also the warmth of unity in our hearts.

Distribution day was met with both excitement and anxiety. We had worked tirelessly, and now it was time to see the fruits of our labor. We were accompanied by members of the Interact clubs of Dhaka, Tongi, and Sylhet Premier. As we entered the flood-affected villages, our hearts ached at the sight of inundated homes and the hardship etched into the faces of the villagers.

Our efforts were rewarded with smiles and gratitude from the recipients. It was a humbling experience to witness the transformation of sorrow into hope. Families received rice, lentils, clean water, and other essential supplies. We listened to their stories, offered a sympathetic ear, and provided the assurance that they were not alone in their struggle.

I couldn't be prouder of my team. They showcased leadership, teamwork, and an unwavering commitment to service above self. Our efforts might not have completely eradicated the pain of those affected by the floods, but they served as a beacon of hope in their darkest hour.

This journey was a testament to the fact that when young minds come together with a shared purpose, they can accomplish remarkable things. Interact is not just an extracurricular activity; it is a platform that nurtures future leaders, instills values, and teaches us that, indeed, united we stand.

In the midst of disaster and despair, we discovered the incredible power of hope, compassion, and collective action. The floodwaters may have receded, but the memories of our journey as Interactors during that time will forever flow in our hearts, reminding us of our duty to serve, today and always.

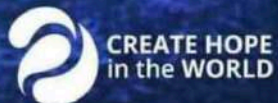

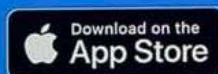

The Rotary Club of Baguio (RCB) was chartered on 21 February 1938. The 4,587th member of Rotary International and the oldest club organized North of Manila; the 6th chartered Rotary Club in the entire Philippines.

Our over-simplified club logo (red) is a composite of the letters r, c & B; this is symbolic of the club's straightforwardness. Over-all cardiode-heart shape connotes that our members serve from the heart. The four basic elements (four quadrants— now 3D bevelled) are symbolic of Rotary's Four-Way Test and the members' commitment to it. Our charter year of 1938 is used as the mid-focal point of the logo, to emphasize our early beginnings and continuing dedication to
