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
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THE CAÑAO & NEW EMBLEM

Symbolizing unity, joy, and gratitude, "Cañao" (pronounced kan-yau) is a traditional dance from the Cordilleras in Northern Luzon of the Philippines, celebrated during feasts and gatherings.

Our new emblem shows a male and female in ritual dance within a native gong—honoring abundance, much like how we celebrate service and fellowship in Rotary. Truly, "A Celebration of Service."



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE




and they quietly inspire others through their steadiness and reliability.

R IN RETROSPECT

THE MEETING THAT WAS: 30 AUGUST 2025

The Rotary Club of Baguio (RCB) held its regular club meeting on 30 August 2025 with **PP Veeh Balajo** as the Program Coordinator, at 12:30pm, called to order by Club **President Joe Ursua**. The session opened with an invocation led by **Rotarian (Rtn.) Annie Viernes**, followed by the introduction of visiting Rotarians and guests by **Past President (PP) Marilyn Baredo**.

At the head table, together with **Pres. Joe**, were **PPs Veeh, Chris Faelnar, Raffy Chan, and Bert Talco**. Also welcomed were **Mr. Raymark Valentino of the Department of Education**, guest of Rtn. Kace Padilla, and an events singer, who serenaded the group with "The Way You Look Tonight" and "Fly Me to the Moon", and **Pres. Raio Bautista** of the Rotary Club of Summer Capital.

The meeting then moved to the **Finest Moment** led by **Rtn. Peter Wasing**, also the Imager, who creatively fined members: P100 who attended the recent Induction Program and P200 for those who did not. The meeting was further enlivened by the **raffle** handled by **Rtn. Levi Orcales**, assisted by **Rtn. Lily Landayan**, which generated P2400 in sales. Multiple winners included Rtns. Bong and Peter; and PPs Gigi Maranan, Bert, Marilyn, Raffy, Chris F and Alfred Laygo.

During **Members' Time**, PP Marilyn presented the **Financial Report of the Induction Program**, citing an income of P236,850 against expenses of P244,890, resulting in a modest overspending of P8,040. New Rtn. Bong Naguit highlighted his good impressions of RCB's service and camaraderie.

PP Mia Cawed informed the members that the **RCB Constitution** and **By-Laws** had been circulated to all members by Sec. Cora de Guzman via email and urged the members to read the same and identify the articles that

they believe need to be amended to be discussed during the 25 October 2025 Constitutional Assembly. PP Raffy Chan relayed that Pres. Eric of RC Pasay appreciated so much RCB's tradition of singing the Rotary Hymn in a circle while holding hands – a practice now adopted by his own club. PP Cora, meanwhile, expressed gratitude to PP Raffy for completing the photo list of all past presidents of RCB which was followed by the playing of the RCB History video.

In **President's Time**, Pres. Joe extended appreciation to everyone who contributed to the success of the Induction Program and announced the upcoming **Public Image Seminar** in San Fernando, La Union on 06 September 2025.

The highlight of the meeting was the **interactive lecture by PP Chris Faelnar on Membership Engagement**, introduced by PP Raffy. PP Chris tackled aspects of engagement, including fellowship, meaningful service, networking and education. He emphasized the importance of welcoming new members, providing mentorship, and creating professional and personal growth opportunities. He also identified challenges such as poor leadership, inadequate orientation, and lack of recognition, while advocating for innovation and inclusivity.

The lecture underscored that a fulfilling Rotary experience is built on **meeting engagement, strong leadership, personal growth, meaningful service and lasting relationships**. A thoughtful response was delivered by PP Bert Talco, who lauded the relevance of the discussion to RCB's continuing commitment to member development.

After the singing of the **RCB Hymn** and **"Pilipinas Kong Mahal"**, Pres. Joe adjourned the meeting at 3:27 pm.

RCB HISTORY: GENESIS OF THE ROTARY CLUB OF BAGUIO

On 27 November 1937, history unfolded in the cool highlands of Baguio City. In the newly inaugurated social hall of the iconic Pines Hotel, the **Rotary Club of Baguio** was conceived under the guidance of our mother club, **Rotary Club of Manila**. The Manila delegation was headed by none other than RC Manila's President, **Justice George Malcolm**, a towering figure in both law and civic leadership. It was a gathering marked by purpose, vision, and a keen sense of the great possibilities that Rotary could bring to the people of Northern Luzon.

Only three months later, on **21 February 1938**, this vision blossomed into reality. Exactly thirty-three years after the founding of Rotary, Rotary International officially approved the **Charter of the Rotary Club of Baguio**, designating it as the **4,587th club** in the worldwide movement and placing it within the **48th District of RI**. With this, Baguio earned its distinction as the **sixth Rotary Club in the Philippines**—after Manila, Davao, Cebu, Bacolod, and Iloilo—and, importantly, as the **first Rotary Club north of Manila**.

From among the **46 prominent Baguio residents** who had attended the organizational meeting, **35 leaders** were chosen as Charter Members. They represented a remarkable blend of backgrounds—**15 Filipinos, 18 Americans, and 2 Japanese**—mirroring the cosmopolitan character of Baguio itself during those years. This diversity enriched the club's spirit from its very inception, making it truly a community that bridged cultures and united people in service.

The formal presentation of the Charter took place on **18 April 1938**, again at the legendary **Crystal Room of the Pines Hotel**, whose very walls seemed to echo with elegance and history. Presiding over this milestone was **Charter President Col. Louis Van Schaick**, whose leadership steered the fledgling club with steady hands. The event was graced by distinguished members of our mother club, RC Manila, led by President **Justice George Malcolm** and Vice President **Dr. Carlos Romulo**.

More than **150 Rotarians and honored guests** traveled from Manila and beyond, a testament to the

significance of this occasion. Among them were figures whose names would later be etched prominently in Philippine history: **U.S. High Commissioner Paul V. McNutt**, future President **Elpidio Quirino**, and Secretary **Antonio de las Alas**. Their presence underscored the prestige and promise of the new club.

The roster of VIP guests was truly illustrious: **John Haussmann**, **Justice Jose P. Laurel**, **Col. Paul L. Murray**, **Budget Commissioner Serafin Jorge Bacobo**, **Dr. Jose Fabella**, **C.M. Cotterman**, and **Auditor General Jaime Hernandez**, each a leader in their own right. The gathering also welcomed fellow Rotarians from across the Philippines, including **Ramon Lopez of Iloilo**, **Jose Avila of Cebu**, and **Emilio Infante of Bacolod**.

It was more than just a ceremony; it was a celebration of service, fellowship, and the spirit of Rotary taking firm root in the mountains of Benguet. That evening in 1938, amidst the pine-scented air of Baguio, the Rotary Club of Baguio was not only born but was also destined to grow into a beacon of community service, friendship, and leadership in Northern Luzon.

PUNCTUALITY IS THE POLITENESS OF KINGS

One of the proudest traditions of the Rotary Club of Baguio is our steadfast commitment to punctuality. Week after week, our Saturday noontime meetings begin on time, reflecting the discipline and respect that has long defined our fellowship. This practice is not just about keeping to a schedule—it is about upholding a culture of reliability, courtesy, and mutual respect that has guided our Club for generations.

This tradition sets us apart, particularly in the local Filipino setting where “Filipino Time” has become a cultural tendency. Many social gatherings often begin late, with delays tolerated as normal. But in our Club, we have chosen a higher path. **We always begin on time**—not out of rigidity, but because we recognize that time is valuable and that respect for it is respect for one another. In doing so, we send a clear message: Rotary is a space where discipline and courtesy prevail.

The famous saying, “**Punctuality is the politeness of kings**,” was attributed to King Louis XVIII of France. At his court, arriving late was considered disrespectful, while promptness was seen as the mark of refinement and courtesy. The idea was simple: **if a king, with all his power, could respect time and keep to it, then how much more should ordinary men and women?** This principle holds true for us in RCBaguio. As leaders in our professions and in our community, punctuality is our way of demonstrating both self-discipline and respect for others.

Being on time is more than convenience—it is a **statement of character**. To arrive promptly is to show reliability and courtesy; it affirms that our commitments matter and that our

word can be trusted. Just as importantly, it acknowledges that every Rotarian’s time is precious. When we start our meetings as scheduled, we say: **“I value your presence, and I will not waste a moment of it.”** In this way, punctuality becomes a visible expression of fellowship itself.

We must also remember that time is a resource unlike any other. Money can be earned again, and possessions replaced. But **once a moment is gone, it is gone forever**. That is why punctuality carries such moral weight: it honors not only our own lives but the lives of those around us. It is the simplest yet strongest way to recognize that our time together is meaningful.

Furthermore, starting promptly reflects Rotary’s culture of excellence. Ours is a Club built on service, fellowship, and high standards. By honoring time, we affirm these ideals in the simplest but most visible way. It sets the tone for all we do—our projects, our commitments, our leadership. **When we respect time, we inspire confidence, strengthen unity, and show the community that we practice the values we uphold.**

As we gather every Saturday noon, let us remember that punctuality is not a small thing. **It is a proud tradition of the Rotary Club of Baguio**, a habit that speaks volumes about our character. Let us resist the lure of “Filipino Time” and instead continue to embody the courtesy of kings: promptness, discipline, and respect.

For in the end, punctuality is not merely about keeping the clock. **It is about keeping faith—with ourselves, our fellow Rotarians, and the community we serve.**
