

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
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## THE CAÑAO & NEW EMBLEM

### GEORGE CANSECO (1934-2004)

The Rotary Hymn has become such a familiar part of our weekly routine that perhaps very few of us ever paused to ask: *Who wrote this song? Where did it come from?*

As it turns out, there is an interesting story behind it. I recall learning about it from PDG Jesus "Jess" Tabora of our very own RI District 3790. He once shared that it was he who personally commissioned none other than George Canseco to compose the hymn. This explains why, for the most part, this beautiful piece of music is especially known and cherished among the clubs of our RI District.

But who exactly is George Canseco? For those of us who grew up in his time, the name needs no introduction. He was one of the most celebrated Filipino composers of his generation. I still remember his old 45 rpm records (only us "old foggies" will understand this!) proudly marked with his trademark emblem: "BY GEORGE!" His fame in the 1970s soared with timeless songs that he wrote for some of the country's most beloved singers.

Among his many works is the classic "Kapantay ay Langit," originally sung by Amapola as the theme of an award-winning motion picture, later popularized by Pilila Corrales, and eventually embraced as her signature song. Another unforgettable masterpiece is "Ngayon at Kailanman," first released in 1977 and immortalized by the golden voice of Basil Valdez. These and many more compositions ensured his place in the hearts of Filipino music lovers.

If you search "George Canseco" on Wikipedia, you will discover even more about his life and career. But today, my hope is simpler: that by remembering him here, we can gain a deeper appreciation of the gifted Rotarian who gave us our hymn. The next time we sing it together, perhaps we will do so with renewed gratitude—for both the music and the man behind it.

# GUEST OF HONOR & SPEAKER

## DR. RONALD CABRAL

**D**octor Ronald P. Cabral is not only a distinguished physician but also an inspiring educator, community servant, and advocate of compassionate healthcare. A proud graduate of the Pontifical University of Santo Tomas, where he earned his Doctor of Medicine degree, Dr. Cabral went on to pursue and achieve board certifications as a Diplomate of both the Philippine Pediatric Society and the Philippine College of Hospital Administrators. This rare combination highlights his deep commitment to both the practice of clinical pediatrics and the broader responsibilities of healthcare leadership and management.

Currently, he serves as Associate Professor III at the College of Medicine and Dentistry of Lyceum Northwestern University. For more than a decade, he has been shaping the minds of future doctors and healthcare professionals, not only by imparting medical knowledge but also by nurturing values of service, ethics, and humanity. His role as Chairman of the University Research Ethics Board further reflects his dedication to maintaining integrity in research and protecting the welfare of participants in medical studies.

Beyond his academic contributions, Dr. Cabral is also an institution builder. In 2005, he established the Saint Albert the Great Science Academy, a Basic Education Institution recognized by both PEAC and SEAMEO. As its founding president, he envisioned and continues to sustain a school that upholds excellence in science education, preparing young learners to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing world with confidence, curiosity, and a strong moral foundation.

Equally impressive is his long-standing commitment to clinical service. With over fifteen years of practice in ambulatory pediatrics, Dr. Cabral has provided accessible and community-centered healthcare to countless children and families. His approach to pediatrics is rooted in compassion, viewing every child not just as a patient but as a precious individual deserving of holistic care.

His advocacy work further amplifies his impact. A staunch believer in public health and harm reduction, Dr. Cabral has consistently used his voice and scholarship to promote equitable, evidence-based practices in medicine. His research and published works mirror his values: compassion for the vulnerable, fairness in access to healthcare, and the pursuit of science that uplifts rather than excludes.

At heart, Dr. Cabral is a man driven by purpose. Whether in the classroom, the clinic, or the community, his guiding principle has always been to serve with empathy and integrity. His story is one of lifelong dedication—not only to healing but also to teaching, inspiring, and leading the next generation.



## RCB HISTORY: SECOND DECADE (1948-1958)

The second decade of the Rotary Club of Baguio was a time of renewal, growth, and service. Beginning with President **Elmer "EW" Herold** in RY 1948 to 1958, the club not only regained its rhythm after the difficult war years but also built a strong foundation for lasting impact in the community. These were years when projects flourished, fellowship deepened, and the presence of Rotary in the City of Pines became both visible and respected.

In 1949-1950, under President **Benjamin "Ben" Salvosa**, the club embarked on a distinctive initiative—the creation of a **goat farm**. It was practical, imaginative, and aimed at improving livelihood opportunities for the local community. More than just an experiment, it showed how Rotarians could think beyond traditional service by promoting sustainability and self-reliance. The project earned the **Governor's Citation for Community Service**, a recognition that underscored the innovative spirit of RCB.

In 1951-1952, with President **Francisco "Ikong" Reyes** leading, the club turned attention to the youth. That year, RCB donated **playground equipment** to several Baguio elementary schools and to **Burnham Park**, gifts that gave countless children a chance to play and grow in safe spaces. The joyful sound of children at play became a living testament to the club's compassion. For this achievement, RCB received the **Youth Service Award**, honoring its contribution to the city's young people.

By 1954-1955, service took on a quieter but enduring form. Under President **Feliciano "Ciano" Belmonte**, the club installed **cement benches** in **Burnham Park**. These benches offered comfort to residents and visitors alike. Though modest in scale, they represented Rotary's belief that even

simple projects can leave a lasting mark on daily life in the city.

In 1955-1956, President **Ernesto "Abe" Abellera** guided the club into health and education initiatives. A **citywide blood typing campaign** was conducted to prepare a roster of potential donors for emergencies. At the same time, RCB donated **books to the Baguio City High School Library**, enhancing educational resources for students and teachers. Both projects addressed essential needs and demonstrated the breadth of Rotary service.

The following year, 1956-1957, under President **Ireneo "Santy" Santos**, the club made one of its most visible contributions. It erected the **Rotary Pylon** at the entrance of Baguio, fronting Baguio General Hospital. The pylon stood as a symbol of Rotary's ideals, greeting all who entered the city and reminding residents of the club's enduring presence.

Finally, in 1957-1958, President **Justo "JR" Rosales** led the donation of a **basketball court and equipment**, a project that fostered health, teamwork, and recreation for the youth of Baguio.

Beyond local service, RCB also strengthened its role in the wider Rotary movement. The club hosted the **District Conference in 1951 and 1954**. Most significantly, **Past President Fernando "Nanding" Manalo** served as **District Governor in RY 1950-1951**, when the entire Philippines still belonged to one district.

Thus, the second decade of RCB was rich in accomplishment, creativity, and pride. From farms to playgrounds, libraries to landmarks, the Rotary Club of Baguio left enduring imprints on the city while nurturing the fellowship that would sustain its legacy for generations.



## PRESIDENTIAL RECKONING - PREPAREDNESS

Here's a question that may tickle both curiosity and debate: *How long does it take before a new Rotarian becomes "presidentialiable"?* Or, asked differently, *how many years does it usually take before our members feel comfortable entrusting the gavel of leadership to one of their own?* There is no official term for this, so allow me to call it "Presidential Reckoning" for purposes of this article.

My personal categorizations are as follows: **SHORT** (just 3 years), **MEDIUM** (5 to 8 years), and **LONG** (10 years or more). Just how many years it took, from entry into the club before becoming RCB President, among our leaders?

**SHORT.** On this special list are PP Benny Sunga and PP Teop Rondez, who both became presidents in just three short years. My take is that they must have been regarded by our members as "presidential material" from the very beginning. Sadly, since this was before most of us joined the club, we will never really know how they pulled it off so smoothly—or how good they truly were in action.

**MEDIUM.** The bulk of our Past Presidents fall here. Curiously, my notes show no one who became president after exactly 4 or 9 years, which leaves the Medium range nicely rounded. After 8 years, we have PP Diony Claridad, PP Baby Kaur, and PP Uwe Koeller. At 7 years: PP Doming Valencia, PP Mike Pearson, PP Bert Talco, PP Gigi, PP Jun Bondoc, and PP Lani. Those who made it after 6 years include PP Chris Peralta, PP Jack Gesner, PP Mia Cawed, and PP Ben Ladilad. And after 5 years, we find PP Veeh Balajo, PP Lito Pangilinan, PP Helmuth Schlaaff, and PP Gerard Audineau.

**LONG.** Now we come to those whose presidential reckoning took a decade or more. This proud group includes: PDG/

PP Linda Winter, PP Raffy Chan, PP Atom Mendalla, PP Florence Bayquen, PP Roger Naz, PP Cora Ocampo, PP Johnny Zarate, and PP Libby Fernandez, among others. Special mention goes to our current President, Joe Ursua, who patiently waited 17 years before being handed the gavel. Our record holder as "president-in-waiting" is undeniably PP Chris Faelnar, whom we "forced" into the presidency after 20 long years as member.

Now, before I get carried away, let me offer a gentle disclaimer: this list is drawn from memory and a bit of record-digging. Errors and omissions are likely, and to those I have unintentionally left out, I extend my apologies.

But beyond the numbers, what does this all mean? Such reckonings inevitably stir quiet questions among Rotarians, whether whispered over coffee or mulled in private:

- Why did she or he become president earlier than I did?
- Am I not yet good enough to be considered for the Presidency?
- Should I resign myself to the idea that I may never be President of RCB?

Perhaps it is unfair of me to put such thoughts into words, but as your Cañao Editor-in-Chief, thinking aloud—and sometimes playing **Devil's Advocate**—is now part of my prerogative.

Some may argue that this topic need not even be raised at all. But if you'll humor me, I'd say there's value in reflecting on it.

Because maybe, just maybe, in talking about Presidential Reckoning, we also discover something about ourselves: our patience, our perseverance, and the way we see leadership within our beloved Rotary Club of Baguio. And that, I think, is worth the reckoning.
