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
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THE CAÑAO & NEW EMBLEM

Symbolizing unity, joy, and gratitude, "Cañao" (pronounced kan-yau) is a traditional dance from the Cordilleras in Northern Luzon of the Philippines, celebrated during feasts and gatherings.

Our new emblem shows a male and female in ritual dance within a native gong—honoring abundance, much like how we celebrate service and fellowship in Rotary. Truly, "A Celebration of Service."

GUEST OF HONOR & SPEAKER

MR. FERDINAND “FERDIE” BALANAG

Ferdinand John “Ferdie” Balanag is a proud son of Baguio whose life’s work beautifully blends artistry, advocacy, and service. A theater artist and filmmaker of remarkable depth, he has carried the stories of his community onto both national and international stages, always guided by a passion for culture and social justice.

His acclaimed documentary *Walking the Waking Journey* brought him to the global spotlight, winning the Golden Ace Award at the Las Vegas International Film Festival and the Mount Hope Award for Social Justice at the Manhattan International Film Festival in New York. The Philippine Daily Inquirer also honored him in 2011 as one of ten outstanding independent film directors in its prestigious Indie Bravo Tribute. These milestones set the tone for a career defined not just by creativity but by meaningful impact.

In Baguio, Ferdie’s leadership has been equally inspiring. He serves on the boards of the Baguio Tourism Council and the Creative Baguio City Council, lending his vision to the city’s cultural and artistic development. He is the founder of the Montañosa Film Festival, which has quickly become a vibrant platform for emerging filmmakers, and he continues to serve as the creative director of *Ibagiw: Baguio Creative City Festival*, now a celebrated annual event.

His creative influence also extended to rebranding efforts for Baguio during the pandemic, where he helped shape the widely acclaimed “Breathe Baguio” campaign. This project not only uplifted local spirits but also earned national recognition, winning the Grand Prize at the 2024 National Tourism Pearl Awards, often called the “Oscars” of Philippine tourism.


Beyond the awards, Ferdie’s enduring legacy lies in his commitment to advocacy. His films often highlight

environmental concerns, cultural heritage, and human resilience. He has documented everything from Cordillera mining communities (*Agbalbalitok*) to Cordillera cuisine (*Mangan Taku*), always giving voice to stories rooted in place and people. His works for UNESCO, Coca-Cola, and various civic organizations further reveal his ability to bridge art and social responsibility. His projects consistently carry a message of hope, encouraging audiences to reflect, connect, and contribute to the betterment of society. Through both intimate storytelling and large-scale cultural events, he reminds us that art is not only a mirror but also a catalyst for change.

For his outstanding contributions, Ferdie was recognized in 2022 as one of Baguio’s Outstanding Citizens—a distinction that reflects his role not only as an artist but also as a cultural steward and community leader.

A graduate of the University of the Philippines Baguio with a degree in Theater Arts and Speech Communication, Ferdie later pursued Mass Communication at the University of Baguio. His early foundation in performance and communication continues to resonate in his multifaceted career as director, producer, writer, and cultural organizer.

Whether through film, stage, festivals, or advocacy campaigns, Ferdie Balanag’s journey is a testament to how one individual can enrich the cultural fabric of a community while inspiring others to dream, create, and serve. Warm, dedicated, and deeply rooted in Baguio’s identity, he remains a beacon of creative leadership, civic pride, and a model for future generations. His story assures us that with passion, purpose, and perseverance, local voices can indeed reach the global stage while still honoring their roots.

RCB HISTORY: SIXTH DECADE (1988-1998)

The Rotary year **1988-1989** was led by **Dr. Dionisio "Diony" Claridad Jr.**, surgeon and hospital administrator. He pursued club projects with vigor, focusing on PolioPlus, Rotary's worldwide campaign for eradication. His term culminated in the successful hosting of the District Assembly, an event that brought pride and recognition to the club.

For RY **1989-1990**, leadership passed to **Engr. Angel "Angel" Ingalla**, a retired regional telecommunications director. He strengthened committees, guiding them to work with greater efficiency and purpose. Among his notable efforts was the construction of water wells that provided clean and safe drinking water for marginalized residents.

The year **1990-1991** was both inspiring and tragic. Businessman **William "William" Tan** assumed the presidency with energy, only to face the devastating July 16 earthquake. The disaster redirected club efforts toward rehabilitation and rebuilding. William's untimely passing in a road accident in May 1990 deeply saddened members. Vice President **Engr. Cyrus Fagar** assumed the role, completing the term with quiet dedication until June 30.

RY **1991-1992** saw **Dr. Benito "Benny" Sunga**, a urologist, take the helm. With Mt. Pinatubo's eruption, Pres. Benny organized relief operations for devastated communities. His initiatives also included the construction of a health center in Asin, providing much-needed medical support to residents.

In **1992-1993**, **Engr. Cyrus "Cy" Fagar** returned as president. His well-rounded program across all avenues of service was recognized internationally, as the club earned an R.I. Presidential Citation from Clifford "Cliff" Dochterman. This was the very first such distinction in the club's history.

Jose "Joe" Taguba's 1993-1994 term emphasized fellowship. He worked on

"humanizing" Rotary by encouraging closer ties among members as the basis for greater service. His legacy included repainting the Rotary Pylon at BGH, a sisterhood relationship with RC Makati, and the formation of the RCB Chorale, which made its maiden performance at the Baguio Convention Center.

For RY **1994-1995**, **Robert "Ruel" Baylosis** continued projects such as monthly medical and dental missions in Irisan and tree planting at the Busol watershed. His townhouse raffle fundraiser raised ₱100,000 for scholarships and services. He also represented the club as voting delegate at the Rotary International Convention in Nice, France.

The **1995-1996** term of **Mining Engineer Dominador "Doming" Valencia** was marked by growth. Membership increased by 30%, and projects flourished—13 medical missions, 5,000 more trees planted, and a community library established in Irisan. His presidency ended memorably with hosting PESETS '96, lauded for its innovative workshop approach.

Engr. Carlos "Caloy" Mendoza presided in **1996-1997**, focusing on training and leadership. His term featured the Kabayao Violin Concert, supported by the RCB Chorale in their first paid public performance. The concert drew acclaim, earning a standing ovation and strengthening Rotary's cultural presence in Baguio.

Closing the decade in **1997-1998**, **Dr. Vicenia "Veeh" Balajo** made history as the club's first lady president. Aside from continuing major initiatives, she introduced signature projects such as Rotamilk, Rotatree, and Rotablood. She also secured the club's first Matching Grant for the Tramline Project in Sablan. Her trailblazing term combined tradition with innovation, setting the tone for Rotary's future.

WHY I REMAIN A ROTARIAN

I have been asked by our new President Raffy for a short article on why I choose to remain a member of Rotary. When I joined the club over forty years ago, we had only two Rotary districts in the entire Philippines and we had the honor of having two Past District Governors in our club—PDG Dr. Nanding Manalo and PDG Tata “Sir” Ikong Reyes. To be a Rotarian was a real privilege back then, and still is to this day. We met at the old Pines Hotel around noon for a short social time before starting our meetings at exactly 12:30! If the President didn’t ring the bell on time, you would see Tata Ikong or one of the other past officers go over to remind him. We also finished right at 2:00, as many of our members had to return to work. The mining people were required to work six days a week and most of our others members returned to their places of work or to their profession Saturday afternoons. If our speaker was really interesting, we might extend the meeting for a short time but the President would notify the members and tell those that would like to leave, that they could do so at that time. We had a lot of fun during the Finest Moments where Tata Pinong Bueno would bring clippings from the Midland Courier of any of the Rotarians who had their picture or were mentioned for whatever reason and were fined for this honor.

We attended many of the District functions together with our Anns. I especially remember flying to Naga City during my term as President in 1972 with a large group and in 1975 when we had over ten couples fly to Cebu for a joint conference; and we brought the house down with our Igorot dance while attired in appropriate G-strings

and beating the ganzas. It seemed one of our members was having difficulty keeping his G-String from falling down! In 1978, I was asked to be the main speaker at a Rotary conference held at the Manila Hotel and spoke on Membership Development in front of over 600 Rotarians. I still have the beautiful Rotary wheel plaque displayed above my bar; of which I am particularly proud.

I was able to maintain 100% attendance for the first ten years of my membership, even though I made up in over 12 countries while flying around the world with my family in 1968 and again in 1974. I also always made up during our trips back to my home in the States. Unfortunately I started having medical problems and underwent my first heart quadruple bypass in 1983. This was a “walk in the park” compared to my second one in the year 2000. During this one, I had another quadruple bypass plus a main valve replaced in my aorta. I also had an endarterectomy which ended my singing career. It seems after they cleaned my carotid artery, it formed an aneurysm which burst just as I was waking up from the operation. This caused the doctors to put in many more stitches and gave me a stiff neck. I said that I should sue the doctor, like Julie Andrews did; but someone said “You couldn’t sing in the first place.” I sure miss being able to sing with the Jack/Al duet and all the Tagalog songs that I love. Of course with a few beers or a little wine, I can still hit some notes.

I also remember when the topic of admitting ladies into the club was discussed. It was my view that we older members had already had our



time and that if the newer Rotarians wanted to accept the ladies, then it was alright with me. It sure proved them right, as we have had two—PP Veeh and PP Linda, as very successful presidents and many more promising ladies in the club now to help lead in the future.

I can’t close without giving due recognition to all the doctors and others who have contributed to the success of our various programs and projects which has made our club so outstanding and which also makes me proud to still be a member of the Rotary Club of Baguio. I look forward to a great year under the stewardship of Raffy and all the other knowledgeable members. Don’t forget us old Rotarians and I hope to be able to attend many more of our meetings in the future. Mabuhay to all!

REMEMBERING PP JACK GESNER

The man was truly a remarkable fellow. The embodiment of the description: *"American by birth but transformed into a Filipino in heart and spirit."*

After re-reading his article from July 2007, my appreciation deepened for just how fortunate we were during those days in Rotary—to have met the older, super-dedicated members of our RCB mother club. Much older they were, both in mind and spirit, yet they carried with them a reservoir of wisdom and experience from which younger Rotarians could drink deeply. Truly, there was so much to learn from them.

My suggestion, to fully appreciate his article *"Why I Remain a Rotarian"*—published in its entirety on the previous page—is to imagine our club during those days in the sixties and seventies. Picture the camaraderie, the discipline, and the high regard members had for Rotary. Meetings were not just scheduled gatherings but treasured rituals of service, fellowship, and commitment.

PP Jack begins by noting his Rotary age—forty years! That alone speaks volumes of his unwavering loyalty. He recalls names such as PDG Nanding Manalo and PDG Ikong Reyes, figures who themselves embody the golden years of Rotary leadership. He describes how meetings were held at the old Pines Hotel, with punctuality so sacred that even a few seconds' delay in ringing the bell earned a firm reminder from past officers. And then, the meetings ended promptly at two o'clock, for members had duties waiting in their workplaces, in the mines, or in their professions.

What strikes me most in his recollections is the sense of order and respect. There was a time to socialize, a time to discuss, and a time to adjourn. Even the *Finest Moments*, when Tata

Pinong Bueno would gleefully fine members whose names or faces appeared in the Midland Courier, reflected a joy in being part of something larger than oneself.

PP Jack also recalls the many conferences and district functions where members traveled together, with their Anns, in full force. He fondly describes their Igorot dance in Cebu—gongs beating, G-strings slipping, and laughter filling the air. The joy was not only in the travel but in the bond that was reinforced with every shared experience.

His article also recounts his commitment to perfect attendance (practically unknown today?) during his early years, even making up meetings in over a dozen countries. Later, health challenges may have slowed him, but never his Rotary heart. Even with surgeries and medical struggles, he retained humor, humility, and above all, gratitude for his Rotary journey.

Perhaps one of his most profound legacies was his open-mindedness. On the issue of admitting women into Rotary, PP Jack did not cling to the past but embraced the future. He acknowledged that his generation had its time, and it was right to give new voices their place. Today, with our women past presidents and leaders, his wisdom has been proven correct.

Remembering PP Jack is looking back at an era when Rotary was lived with discipline, joy, and total dedication. He may be gone but he still reminds us that beyond projects and titles, Rotary is about belonging to a community that transforms us. His life and words remain a beacon, urging us to keep the flame of service alive.

We will always fondly remember you, PP Jack.
