

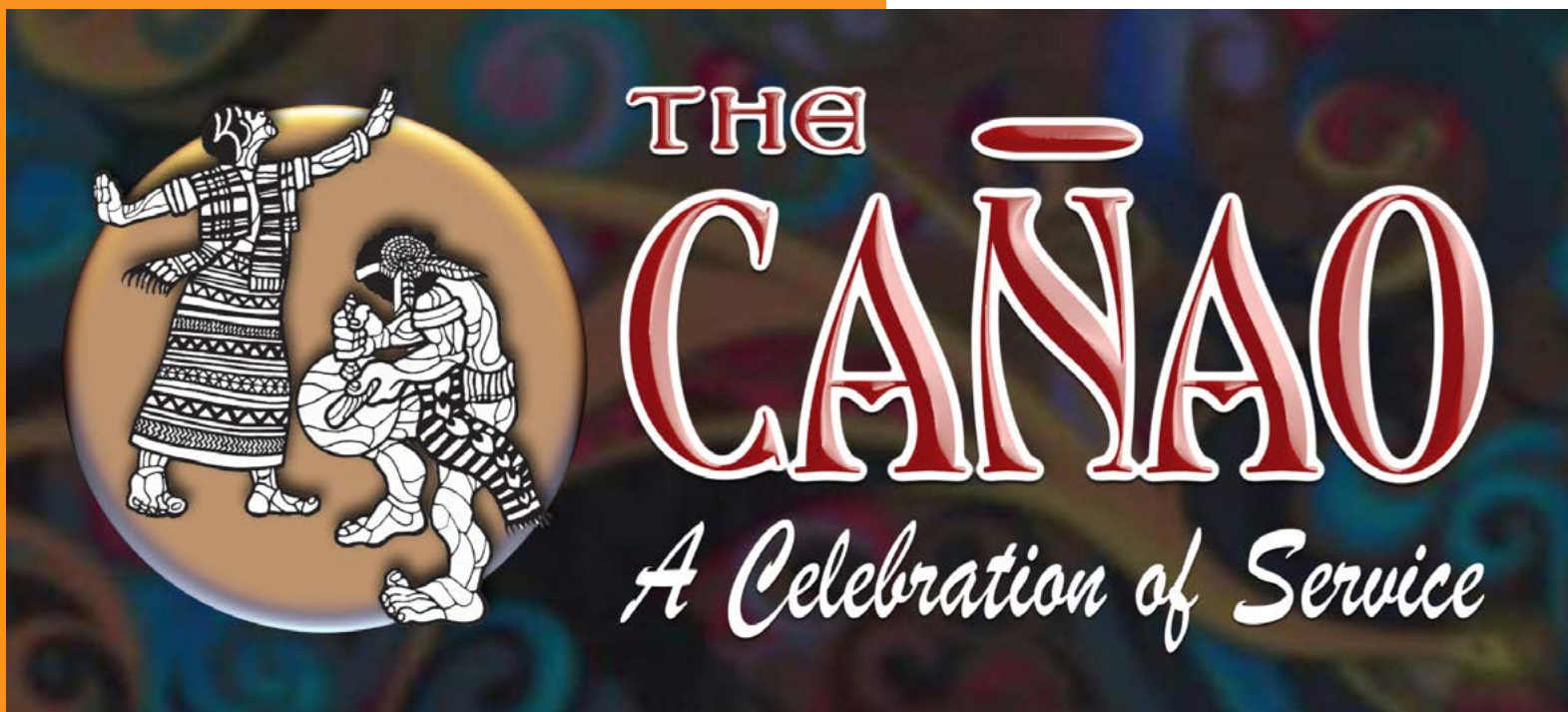

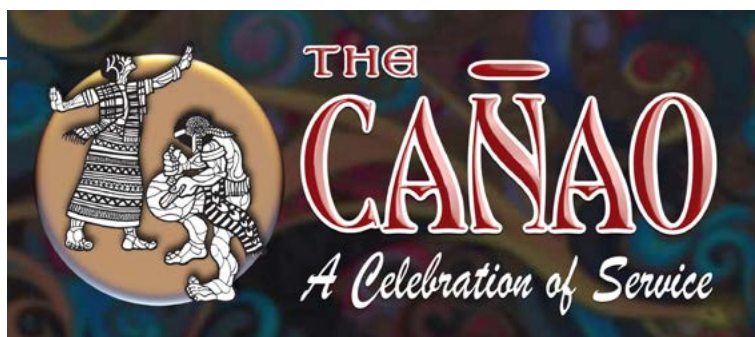

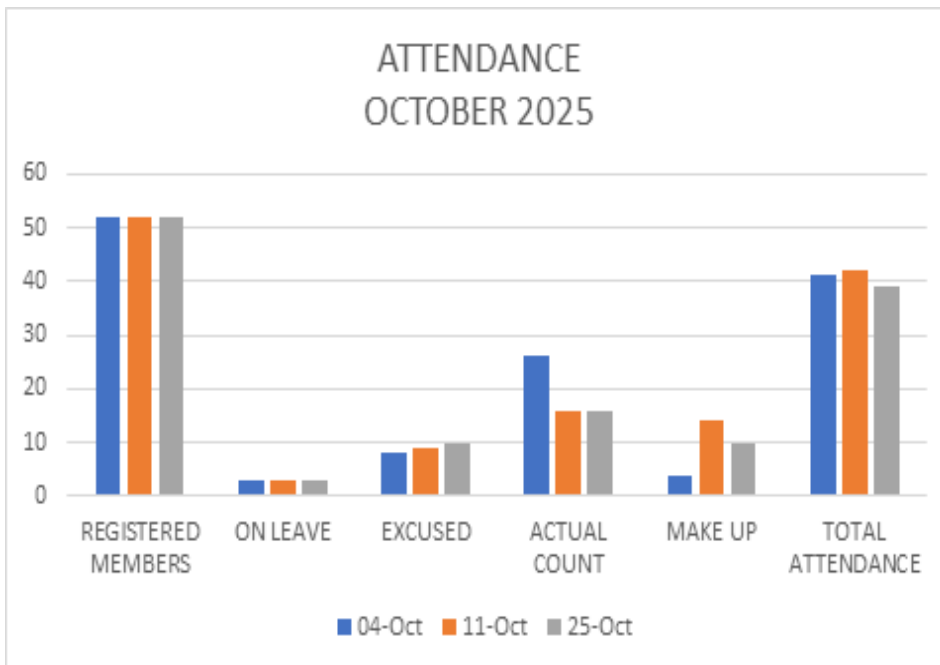

PP FRANCIS “ALI” MORALES

Born and raised in Baguio City, Ali began showing initiative early in life—as a high school newsboy delivering newspapers by bicycle in Lamut, Ifugao. From those modest roots, he went on to earn a **Bachelor’s Degree in Accountancy from Saint Louis University**, where he was a consistent **Dean’s Lister** and recipient of the **Far East Bank Scholarship Foundation Grant**. He later pursued advanced studies at the **Asian Institute of Management**, finishing **Top 2 in his class**, and completed numerous financial management and investment certification programs that enhanced his professional competence.

Ali’s professional path is marked by over three decades of excellence in the banking industry. Rising through the ranks—from bookkeeper to **Vice President and Cluster Head of BDO Unibank’s Baguio Session Road Branch**—he has earned admiration for his integrity, strategic leadership, and unwavering commitment to customer trust. His early years with **Far East Bank & Trust Company** and **Equitable PCI Bank** honed his discipline and strengthened his skills in both financial management and organizational leadership.

Within Rotary, Ali’s service story is equally distinguished. Now serving as **Chairman of The Rotary Foundation**, Ali continues to exemplify the true spirit of “Service Above Self.” His dedicated stewardship ensures that the Club’s generosity continues to uplift lives—fueling Rotary’s mission of advancing peace, improving health, supporting education, and promoting community development. Through his guidance, RCBaguio has maintained its distinction as one of the top-giving clubs in the entire district, a testament to his focus and quiet yet effective leadership.

Beyond Rotary, Ali is known for his humility, kindness, and disciplined work ethic. He is married to **Maura Gloria Lorenzo-Morales** of Cauayan, Isabela, and they are blessed with a son, **Francis Jan Lorenzo**, whose youthful enthusiasm and curiosity inspire his father’s own sense of hope and purpose.

From newsboy to banker, mentor, and now one of Rotary’s pillars in Baguio, **Rtn. Francis Ali Morales** remains a shining example of dedication, perseverance, and the power of service-driven leadership—an inspiration to both Rotarians and the wider community he continues to serve so well.

Pres. Joe then presented the Club's Certificate of Appreciation to Mr. Balanag, after which everyone rose for the singing of the RCB Hymn and *Pilipinas Kong Mahal*.

RCB HISTORY: SEVENTH DECADE (1998-2008)

The Rotary year **1998–1999**, under **Engr. Rene “Rene” Ronquillo**, began with strong international fellowship. Seven Rotarians traveled to Japan for the anniversary of sister club RC Matsubase. They also attended a meeting of RC Tokyo Josai, which generously extended additional support to the RCB scholarship fund—an enduring symbol of friendship and goodwill.

In **1999–2000**, **Loreto “Lito” Pangilinan** led with energy and dedication. The club earned the Governor’s Award of Excellence, was named Most Outstanding Club in Area 1, and received the RI Presidential Citation. RCB was recognized for exemplary performance across all avenues of service. The club bulletin also won second place in the district competition.

Erlindo “Earl” Tesoro presided in **2000–2001**. After much deliberation, regular meetings were permanently moved to the Baguio Country Club. Highlights included two toilet projects for Quezon Elementary School, participation in the Asian Presidential Conference in Manila, and a brotherhood agreement with RC Mutya ng Pasig.

Dr. Alfredo “Alfred” Laygo, in **2001–2002**, worked under the theme “Mankind is Our Business.” His year featured the formation of RC Baguio Sunrise, hosting RYLA, a fundraising Halloween Dance, vocational awards, and the hosting of a GSE Team from Texas. His administration received ten district awards, including Outstanding Club and Outstanding President.

Dr. Horatio Christopher “Chris” Peralta, in **2002–2003**, carried the theme “Sow the Seeds of Love.” Membership rose to 56 with strong attendance. The club completed six toilet projects funded by a Matching Grant with RC Matsubase, and held seven medical-dental-legal missions serving over 2,500 patients. RCB also sponsored an Interact Club in Dalupirip, hosted a GSE Team from Newcastle, Australia.

Linda “Linda” Winter, in **2003–2004**, emphasized action and strength. With 64 members—the club’s all-time high—her term included a citywide clean-up drive, a youth study exchange, six medical missions, hosting a GSE Team from Brazil, and the successful fundraising concert “Divine Diva Live” with Zsa Zsa Padilla. Thirteen district awards, including Top Club in TRF contributions.

German Rotarian **Helmut “Helmut” Schlaaff**, in **2004–2005**, championed fellowship, often asking “Are you happy?” Projects included micro-financing in Tuba, participation in the Asia Pacific Rotaract Conference, and hosting RYLA 2005. Nine awards, including Outstanding Club and President, were conferred.

In **2005–2006**, **Terrence Michael “Mike” Pearson** stressed fellowship and proper decorum in meetings. His “Team 101” concentrated efforts in Barangay Luding with sanitation, literacy, day-care, and livelihood projects. The club also hosted GSE Teams from the USA and Taiwan, and earned eight District awards.

Frenchman **Gérard “Gérard” Audineau**, in **2006–2007**, implemented four major Matching Grants—for feeding, Braille resources, computers, and a water distribution system. Under the theme “Lead the Way,” he strengthened youth programs, medical missions, and TRF support. Truly a very successful year which concluded with multiple awards, including an RI Significant Achievement Award.

Architect Rafael “Raffy” Chan, in **2007–2008**, inaugurated the RI Club Leadership Plan (CLP) under the theme “Rotary Shares.” Innovations included Quarterly Grand Fellowships, six medical missions, and the launch of the Ten Outstanding Young Athletes (TOYA) Awards. This year, ended with over twenty accolades including Most Outstanding Club Award, Outstanding Club President Award, Top Awards in All Avenues of Service and the Outstanding Club Bulletin Award.

THE INVOCATION AGENDA

One of the most beautiful traditions in Rotary meetings is how we begin—with **an Invocation, or what some may also call a Doxology**. At first glance, this may seem like a simple opening ritual, but in truth, it carries with it a deeper purpose. The Invocation is an act of humility, a reaching out for guidance, wisdom, and strength as we gather to deliberate on matters of service, fellowship, and community.

From the very onset, our Club has recognized that this **Invocation must be ecumenical**. It should be **inclusive, not tied to one particular denomination**, but respectful of the diversity that exists within our membership. This approach allows every Rotarian and guest, regardless of their faith or persuasion, to feel welcomed and represented.

I recall a time in our club's history when one of our members, was a devout Muslim. Had he been assigned to do the Invocation, he would have addressed Allah with reverence and sincerity—though expressed in a different way. That moment never happened but remains in my mind as a testament to Rotary's spirit of openness and mutual respect.

Of course, not all Invocations are truly pleasant and meaningful. At times, they can become **too formulaic**, repetitively invoking blessings for the guest speaker, the guests, the officers, and the members, almost in checklist fashion. While well-intentioned, such prayers run the risk of sounding monotonous, or worse, disengaging the very audience they are meant to inspire. An Invocation should uplift, not drone; it should inspire reflection, not become mere background noise.

It was with this in mind that during Rotary Year 2007–2008, one of our past presidents introduced an innovative change. Instead of the usual Invocation, he opted for **something fresh and thought-provoking**—a short audio-visual presentation, aptly called **"Reflection Moments."** These were brief yet meaningful segments that set the tone for the meeting, offering inspiration through images, words, and music. **The concept allowed us to pause and reflect, to set aside the rush of daily life, and to enter the meeting with open hearts and minds.**

This shift highlighted an important truth: whether through prayer, reflection, or meditation, **what matters most is the spirit in which we begin our gatherings**. The Invocation is not a mere item on the agenda to be rushed through. Rather, it is **an opportunity to draw strength from values we hold dear—service, fellowship, compassion, and integrity**. It reminds us that Rotary is not only about projects and programs but about people, and the shared ideals that bring us together.

As we move forward, perhaps we can continue to re-imagine the Invocation agenda—not as a rigid format, but as a living tradition that adapts to the times while staying true to its purpose. **Whether spoken aloud in prayer, offered silently in thought, or expressed creatively through reflections**, let it **always serve as a unifying force** that prepares us, as Rotarians, to serve above self.

In this way, each Invocation—however it is delivered—becomes a gentle reminder that Rotary is not just about what we do, but why we do it.
